COMMENCEMENT LARGELY ATTENDED

Splendid Program in Weber Academy—Prest. F. M. Lyman Addresses Students.

CO. SCHOOLS MEET JUNE 5.

In Ogden Tabernacle for Commencement Program—District Court Hearings—Ernest Held.

OGDEN, May 27.—More than 1,200 people filled the auditorium at the Weber academy to witness the annual commencement exercises of that institution, when 26 young ladies and gentlemen were presented with certificates of attainment. A splendid program was rendered, a feature of it being the splendid address to the graduates by President Francis M. Lyman, of the council of apostles of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, whose theme was "The Treasures of the Future."

The program opened with an overture by the Weber academy orchestra. President Lewis W. Shurtliff offered invocation. In his characteristic pleasant manner, Prof. Wilford M. McKendrick, principal of the academy, extended a hearty welcome to those present. Next followed a rendition of the cantata, "Feast of Abundance," by the academy choir and orchestra, under the direction of Prof. Joseph Ballantyne.

The valedictory address given by Paul Jensen brought back many pleasant memories to the graduates and forecasted a brilliant future for members of the class. After the presentation of diplomas by Elder David O. McKay, benediction was offered by President C. F. Middleton.

In the presentation of diplomas Elder McKay, the former principal of the academy, had a particularly pleasant word for each of the graduates, whom he had known for years.

WEBER COUNTY SCHOOLS.
OGDEN, May 27.—The commencement exercises of the Weber county schools will be held in the Ogden tabernacle, June 5, at 10 a. m. Supt. L. E. Eggerston announced last evening that Rev. E. L. Goshen of Salt Lake City, will address the graduates.

DISTRICT COURT CASES.
OGDEN, May 27.—In the district court yesterday afternoon, the Ogden Rapid Transit company instituted condemnation proceedings against John S. and Eva P. Lewis, to secure a right of way over their property in Ogden canyon. The plaintiff asks for a right of way 16 feet wide and 2,074 feet in length.

The J. P. O'Neill Construction company has brought suit against Ogden City to recover \$2,824.50, alleged to be due for extra work done in sewer district No. 16, per an agreement with the city made August 13, 1906.

The case of Clara Scherer against Mrs. W. O. Stanley, which was appealed from the municipal court, was heard before Judge Howell in the district court yesterday. The action was to recover damages in the sum of \$250. On August 26 of last year, while enroute to the Lagoon, the two women engaged in an altercation over a seat. Mrs. Scherer subsequently instituted suit against Mrs. Stanley for \$250 for injuries alleged to be sustained. The defendant answered the plaintiff's charge and filed a counter claim of \$200 for injuries she sustained in the fist

fight.
