

SENATOR DUBOIS ON MORMONISM.

He Attacks It Savagely in an Address Before the Mothers' Congress.

HE GOES FOR PRESIDENT SMITH.

Accuses Mormon People of Being Doubled Faced in Politics—He Admits They Are Industrious.

Washington, March 14.—Senator Dubois of Idaho talked to the Mothers' congress tonight on "The Purity of the Home." His speech was chiefly a historical review of "Mormonism" in the United States and a severe arraignment of the doctrine and practices of the "Mormon" organization. He declared with emphasis that there should be no toleration of the present teaching and practices of the Mormon hierarchy and in suggesting a remedy said: "It is the duty of the United States to see to it that the Mormon people are not allowed to place their hands on the law, that the institutions of this country must prevail throughout the country and second, there should be an amendment of the Constitution which would give to the federal government the right to place political control by the church entirely out of the realm of possibility."

Senator Dubois declared that "Mormonism" is a doctrine, not the greatest, single menace which confronts us as a people. Polygamy, he said, was practiced by Joseph Smith as early as 1830 as a command from God, and it has been practiced from that date in defiance of all law. Then the senator continued: "The President of the Mormon Church and one-half of the Apostles are now living in polygamy today, and the testimony taken before the committee showed that several of the Apostles have entered into polygamous marriages since the testimony of the committee. It is known that new polygamous marriages are being continually entered into. The political strength of this organization has increased, until now, in addition to absolutely controlling Utah they hold the balance of power in Idaho and Wyoming, and are spreading over and through Oregon, Nevada and have a following of considerable importance in other western states. Their great aim is political power as to protect them in their polygamous practices. It is impossible now to elect a senator from Utah, Idaho or Wyoming who will oppose the methods and practices and governing power of the Mormon hierarchy is strong enough to elect the senators in Idaho and Wyoming, but I do say that they are sufficiently powerful to defeat anyone for the United States senate in either of these states if they desire to, and I will say in addition that they have a disposition to exercise the power to elect anyone in either Idaho or Wyoming for the United States senate, for

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OTHER WORLDS.

Congress or for governor who will oppose them in the exercise of their political power or who will undertake to punish them for their polygamous practices. Notwithstanding the testimony which Joseph Smith gave before the senate committee, no one has the temerity in Utah to undertake to prosecute him, and it is utterly impossible that President Roosevelt will enforce the laws of Utah against him. In Idaho the condition is the same—the head of the Mormon Church there, President William Budge, testified before the senate committee that he was living with three wives, and that they had borne him children since the manifesto, yet the Idaho legislature which has just adjourned could not put on our statute books laws under which President Budge or any other polygamist or person living in polygamous relations can be convicted and punished. The Idaho legislature began its session by electing a Mormon as speaker, an attempt was made to pass effective laws, but failed.

"The political power of this Church is becoming so great that it is not confined to one western state, where they live, but I fear that it is becoming an object of solicitude to the greatest national parties. The Mormons voted the Republican ticket at the last election. They are now coming Republican senators and congressmen whenever they can. During Mr. Cleveland's campaign they were all Democrats, and if a Democratic president should be elected in four years, they would turn again to the Democratic party. I wish to give my solemn warning to the Republicans that they should not be misled by the fact that they have allied in the Mormon hierarchy. The Mormon hierarchy hope to have an ally in the Republican party. It would please them equally to have the Democratic party as their ally and to give the Democratic party their support if the Democratic party were in power."

"With the power of this organization spreading so rapidly over the entire western country, carrying with it everywhere the poison of polygamy, our only hope is in the good women of the United States. Think of it for a moment. These fifteen men at the head of this great organization claim as a divine right to absolutely control their followers in all things temporally and spiritually. More than one-half of these 15 are living in open polygamy; are standing in plain defiance of the laws of the land and posing as worthy examples of their president. They control the public schools of Utah almost entirely and the public schools in a large part of Idaho and Wyoming, and are teaching their doctrine in the public schools. They are holding the children, Gentile and Mormon, the polygamists who have passed away and the polygamists who are living as models for their imitation."

Senator Dubois declared that the government of the "Mormon" Church consists of a band of men involved in a system which means almost unlimited power over their adherents. He severely criticized the system and said that a more dreadful thing has not appeared in our American civilization than this. Millions are at the command of a corrupt leader with which to maintain his power and work further corruption. He said that practically all the apostles are polygamists, there being two or three exceptions, and probably because these particular men did not get into polygamy before the present controversy arose.

About the "Mormon" people, followers as he called them, Senator Dubois made this complimentary allusion: "I ought to close, but I must say a few words about the Mormon people, the followers. Most of them practise the virtues of industry, thrift, sobriety, honesty and, outside of polygamy, personal virtue. Their articles of faith seem to them to represent to them all the morality, and the revelations which their leaders proclaim from time to time seem to them to set them above all other peoples in the world."

NEBULAR HYPOTHESIS.

Harvard Astronomers Expect to Prove or Disprove a New One.

Cambridge, Mass., March 15.—Harvard's astronomers expect to prove or disprove a new theory concerning the nebular hypothesis of the discovery of the seventh satellite of Jupiter by Prof. Percival Lowell.

The theory is advanced by Prof. William Pickering in explanation of the retrograde motion of Phoebe, ninth satellite of Saturn, discovered by him in March, 1899.

Phoebe was found to be traveling in the opposite direction from any known satellite, and Mr. Pickering conceived the idea that when first cast off it was moving in a retrograde motion, but as Saturn gradually "keeled over" the planet's motion changed, until it was finally rotating directly. The other satellites were thrown off after this motion changed but Phoebe maintained its original motion from right to left. His theory is that all the planets have keeled over or are keeling over, Jupiter having nearly completed the process.

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PARTY LINES ARE DRAWN ON TREATY.

Prospects Now Are That One With San Domingo Will Fail of Ratification.

AN INVESTIGATION IS POSSIBLE.

If Had, Would be as to Character of Claims, Stability of Government and Force Needed to Keep It Intact.

Washington, March 14.—The discussion of the Dominican treaty in executive session of the senate today resulted in the drawing of party lines. The Democrats who have been reported as likely to support the treaty will return to the fold, it is said, and on both sides of the chamber it is admitted there is little prospect that the convention will be ratified. The Republicans have been depending on some Democratic support and have counted on certain votes of Senators McEnery and Foster of Louisiana, and Clarke of Arkansas. Senator Gorman, the minority leader, gave notice today that these senators are now pledged against the treaty, and it was stated that Senator McEnery tomorrow will recall his telegram authorizing Senator Cullom to pair him for the convention. It is not expected that either Senator Clarke will return to Washington to vote. Senator Foster will remain in Washington and vote with his party. The Republicans had planned to call the senate to order, but it was reported tonight that the full Republican strength here the necessary two-thirds vote for ratification could not be mustered if there is no defection of Democratic votes.

The defection of the Republican ranks by reason of the vacancies in Missouri and Delaware, the absence of Senator La Follette, who has not taken the oath of office, and of Senators Aldrich and Knox, is felt greatly by the Democrats, who are striving for favorable action on the treaty. A canvas of the senate has not developed the two-thirds vote necessary, even counting all Republicans as pledged to support the treaty. The statement of the Democrats that there will be no division in their party proves correct, or if the two Louisiana senators and Clarke of Arkansas should vote against it, there is no chance for ratification of the treaty.

Because of the doubt of the ratification, which was talked of seriously today for the first time, the suggestion was made that action should be postponed until after an investigation has been made of all the conditions in San Domingo, including the character of the claims and the stability of the Dominican government and the force that would be required to keep it intact. This proposition came from the Democrats and credit for originating it has been given to Senator Morgan. It has not met with favor because of the indifference to the fate of the treaty which was expressed by a number of Republican senators. So far as the propriety of the senate making an investigation is concerned, it was said the step would be unprecedented, and that an inquiry if it is to be had, should be made through the president. It is understood that the subject of appointing a commission to make the inquiry has not yet been presented to the president, and it is assumed there will be no postponement of the vote unless such action meets the approval of the president, which is not deemed likely.

The affirmative and negative on the treaty took on a decided partisan bias today. Senators Morgan, Teller and other Democratic senators criticized the administration severely. The first speech was made by Senator Teller, who asserted that the administration could not be blameless in permitting Commander Dillingham to exercise so much authority. Fault was found particularly with Commander Dillingham for his action in taking control of the port of Monte Cristi. Into this discussion there were injected many pointed questions in which practically all of the Democrats participated. So harsh was the criticism of the administration that Senator Spooner devoted nearly half an hour to a general defense of the course of the department of state. He disclaimed for the department responsibility for a great part of the procedure of the naval officer, Senator Foraker and Senator Cullom followed along the same lines. Senator Bacon started to address the senate at 5 o'clock, but had proceeded only a few minutes when he was seized with a severe attack of gastritis and was unable to go on.

The senate then adjourned. The senate has changed its hour of meeting to 12 o'clock.

AN IDAHO TRAGEDY.

G. F. Rence of Dry Creek Shoots Henry Clark.

Boise, Id., March 14.—Henry Clark was shot through the lungs today by G. F. Rence. He was brought to the hospital and has a good chance to recover. The shooting occurred on Dry Creek, about 10 miles from the city. Rence claims self-defense. Both men are farmers owning land in the locality of the scene of the shooting. Rence came to town and gave himself up to the sheriff.

Plague Situation Improving.

New York, March 15.—The plague situation is improving since the arrival of Serum and other necessities, cables the Herald correspondent at Peking, China. One patient is reported to have flung himself into the sea while in a state bordering on despair. However, he was rescued and recovered shortly afterward.

RUINS OF BISMAYA.

Their Exploration to Be Resumed Immediately.

Chicago, March 14.—Prof. Robert Francis Harper of the University of Chicago, who is director of the expedition of the oriental exploration fund, now in Assyria, has received a telegram announcing that the work of excavating the ruins of Bismaya, which was suspended last autumn, is to be resumed. The dispatch was from Victor Persons, engineer in charge, and stated that the sender started for Bismaya from Bagdad on March 9.

The excavation was begun in Dec. 1903, and continued until several months ago, when it was abandoned by order of the Turkish government. The permission to resume work is the result of Dr. Harper's recent trip to Constantinople.

Bismaya which has been identified as the Adab of ancient inscriptions, is one of the most important of Babylonian cities and flourished possibly as early as 4,000 or 5,000 before Christ. No history of the place ever has been discovered and tradition does not record the name of its ruling dynasty.

CITY OF RIO DE JANEIRO.

Petitions to Bring Suits for Deaths Due to Its Sinking Denied.

San Francisco, March 15.—The petitions of several parties who wanted to sue the Pacific Mail Steamship company for deaths and accidents resulting from the sinking of the steamer City of Rio de Janeiro in February, 1901, were denied by United States Judge de Haven. Catherine Brady was denied her petition to set aside and vacate the decree entered in January, 1903, against all persons who had not then appeared as sailor against the steamship company as a result of the wrecking of the Rio Janeiro. Like petitions of Joseph Flinn and Judith Smith were also denied.

KILLED HIS WIFE.

Wm. Treblecox of Grass Valley, Cal., Shoots Her Dead.

Grass Valley, Cal., March 14.—Shortly before 1 o'clock this afternoon William Treblecox shot and instantly killed his wife and dangerously wounded her cousin, young Charles Allen, at the outskirts of this city. No apparent cause is given for the crime. Treblecox and his wife had been married eight years and his life was unhappy. He came home, after an absence of some time, and was met at the front door by Allen, who has not yet reached his majority.

He burst in, ordered Allen out of the place and threatened to kill him. Allen, who was armed with a .22-caliber pistol, having caught sight of Treblecox's weapon, and fired. The shot went wild and Treblecox reached around the door and fired, sending a bullet through Allen's thigh. He then dashed through the door, and his wife fled out of the rear door. As she did so, the infuriated husband fired at close range, the bullet striking her in the back of the head, she fell dead in a pool of blood.

Allen then escaped and ran for a neighbor's house, where he hid. He was later captured and taken to the county jail in Nevada City, where he is being held for trial. On the way to the county jail they had to pass the scene of the murder. A crowd gathered as he passed with the officers, but no demonstration was made.

Young Allen was badly wounded, and is too weak to make a statement yet.

Nevada Legislature Adjourns.

Reno, Nev., March 14.—The twenty-second session of the Nevada legislature came to an end at 2 o'clock this afternoon, when both houses adjourned sine die.

San Francisco, March 14.—Isaac Selby, 35, told the jury he had been shot at Australia who, several months ago, shot at Superior Judge Hebbard while the latter was on the bench, was today sentenced to seven years in state prison.
