# BISHOP SPALDING ON UTAH POLYGAMY

Exiscopalian Prelate Urges Writers to Refrain From Touching Upon Mormon Questions.

(Special to The News.) San Proncisco, Oct. 28.—Histop Spalding of Salt Lake is in San Francisco attending the annual convecation of the Enincopal sturch for this diocese. In an address before that body, he is quoted by The Call as saying: "Women more than men have been responsible for polyenmy in 17tah. Twice, white Utah was a territory, when wamen had the right of suffrage, so per cent favored polygamy; and not until their right of suffrage was taken from them was the territory admitted into the

Union."

The Examiner quotes the bishop as mying: "Polyg my is dyng out, has almost disappeared, leaving not more than 60¢ polygamous families in Italiantic polygamous families in polygamous families in the spread by missionaries to incite interest without regard to actual conditions. Christianity would be bettered if writers refrained from touching upon the working features of Mornonism.

Bishop Spalding lectured at the Episcopal parish church at Oaklandiast evening taking "Mornon Teachings" as his subject. He affirmed that the Mornon people were reaching after four great truths when the church was founded, a pageonal God, incarnation, immortality and consception of organized authority. Polygamy, he said, was due to a liberal translation of the Bible and the belief that every soul in the future Big has a corporal body. He said that the Mormon Church was a wonderful organization embracing selicious solitical, social and com-

was a wonderful organization embrac-ing religious, political, social and com-mercial enterprises. He appealed to the Episcopalians to send missioneries among the Mormons, the miners and among the Mormons the Indians of Utah.


