# CONTROL OF PUBLIC PARKS

New Ordinance of Far Reaching Importance Being Prepared For City Council.

EX. MAYOR CONROY HONORED

ogden, Jan. 9 .- A new ordinance rehing to the control of public parks within Ogden City, is being prepared to be presented to the city council for passage, which makes the violation of the same punishable by a fire not exceeding \$100, 3 months' imprisonment, or both fine and imprist. It is provided in the ordi-that it shall be unlawful to ment. plant, remove, trim, spray, cut or in any way injure any tree or shrub in any of the thoroughfares of Ogden without permission of the park com-missioners. It shall be unlawful to bitch or tie any animal to a tree so ft can damage it by biting or other-

No person shall be permitted to move No person shart be permitted to move any building or other object so as to in any way injure or destroy any rress or shrubbery. No property own-er will be allowed to permit any dead tres, limbs or overhanging boughs, dangerous to life or property, to re-main after due notice from the com-missioners. No trees or shrubs can be set out on any of the streets except such as are provided for and are per-mitted by the commissioners.
