CONTROL OF PUBLIC PARKS

New Ordinance of Far Reaching Importance Being Prepared For City Council.

EX-MAYOR CONROY HONORED

By Officers of Police Department—1. O. O. F. Officers—Wedding Permits—Hotel Robbed.

Ogden, Jan. 8.—A new ordinance relating to the control of public parks within Ogden City, is being prepared to be presented to the city council for passage, which makes the violation of the same punishable by a fine not exceeding \$100, 3 months' imprisonment, or both fine and imprisonment. It is provided in the ordinance that it shall be unlawful to plant, remove, trim, spray, cut or in any way injure any tree or shrub in any of the thoroughfares of Ogden without permission of the park commissioners. It shall be unlawful to pitch or in any manner to throw any object or damage it by biting or otherwise.

No person shall be permitted to move any building or other object so as to be in any way injure or destroy any tree or shrub. No property owner will be allowed to permit any dead trees, limbs or overhanging boughs, dangerous to life or property, to remain after due notice from the commissioners. No trees or shrubs can be cut out on any of the streets except as are provided for and are permitted by the commissioners. Public meetings, amusements, etc., will only be permitted in the parks on permission of the park commissioners. No abusive or indecent language will be tolerated in the parks, and no defacement of any tree, shrub or building allowed, and dogs will not be permitted to run at large in the parks.

Death of Mrs. Melatchie—Scarlatina And Measles Prevalent.

Kanosh, Millard Co., Jan. 7.—Mrs. Susan Morris Melatchie died Jan. 3, aged 73 years, and was buried Sunday, the 15th. Deceased was born and reared in the pioneer settlement, England, and came to America in the early sixties, remained at Newark, N. J., working to obtain means to help her get to Utah. She came on to Wash. D. C., accompanied by her little nephew, Henry Reynolds. At Wash. D. C. she married S. R. Melatchie, and with her husband came to Kanosh about 50 years ago. SEVIER COUNTY AFFAIRS.

Session of the District Court—Movement Against Liquor Traffic.

Richfield, Sevier Co., Jan. 7.—At the regular monthly meeting of the county commissioners held yesterday the following business was transacted:

The salary of the deputy county recorder was raised from \$25 to \$30 per month.

The resignation of Christo Hydahl, justice of the peace of Elsinore precinct, was accepted, and Emil Christoferson appointed to fill the vacancy. The sum of \$300 was appropriated to aid in the construction of a road between Monroe and Joseph.

Bids were considered for the building of a bridge over the Sevier river near Brooklyn. It was found that there were but two bids each for the sum of \$190. Upon consideration the commissioners rejected both bids and ordered the bridge constructed under the supervision of Commissioner H. C. Larsen.

One cell in the county jail was leased to the city of Richfield for one year, the consideration being \$50.

The usual appropriations for salaries and expenses were made.

DISTRICT COURT SESSIONS.

The regular January term of the district court began this morning and the following business was had: Judge J. E. Chadster occupying the bench.

Amos Nymley was arraigned on the charge of assault and entered a plea of not guilty. His case was set for trial for Friday, Jan. 10.

Arthur Hodges was arraigned on the charge of grand larceny. He pleaded not guilty and his case was set for trial on Saturday, Jan. 11.

John Christoferson and Louis Soderberg, two young men from Elsinore, who had heretofore been before the court on a charge of immorality, submitted evidence to the effect that they had since married the girls they had wronged and defendants having heretofore entered a plea of guilty, the court suspended sentence indefinitely.

The case of Lost Creek Irrigation company vs. William H. Rex and John Jennings having been remanded back by the supreme court to clear the record, was considered for a short time, whereupon the matters in issue were compromised.

Nils Rasmussen, a native of Denmark, was admitted to citizenship. The jury summoned for this term will be in attendance tomorrow.

Death of a Good Woman—School Opening Deferred.

Salina, Sevier Co., Jan. 6.—Hannah Anderson, a highly respected resident of this place, passed away Saturday morning, Jan. 4, heart disease and dropsy being the cause.

Mrs. Anderson was born in Denmark, Dec. 31, 1852; emigrated to Utah with her widowed mother in 1856. At the age of 19 years, Mrs. Anderson married David Hamilton, who six years later died while working on the St. George Temple, who left her with two children.

In 1880, she married M. C. Anderson of this place. The deceased, who was a most estimable woman, is survived by her husband and six children.
