## UTAH CON. READY TO BUILD SMELTER

C. R. McBride Authorized to Secure Options on Lands Near Tooele.

TWENTY THOUSAND ACRES

Carrying Out of Undertaking Means Much for Citizens of County West of Oquirrh Range.

C. R. McBride of Tooele who has been securing options on property for the Utah Consolidated Mining company in the vicinity of the proposed smeiter site in Pine canyon this morning came to Salt Lake for a conference. He announced that he had been authorized to close up the options and Mr. Risque had informed him that active construction on the proposed smelters would commence immediately after he had visited Toocle and personally inspected the situation for the last time.

Mr. McBride leaves for home tonight and expects by the end of the week to have closed up 20,000 acres which in addition to the 1,200 acres already purchased by the Utah Consolidated, bring the total up to 21,200 acres. The company already has paid out \$50,000 for its holdings in Tooele and expects to expend a mint of money in that section this summer.

"No chancese will be taken on damage suits along the lines of those instituted in Salt Lake county for the Utah Consolidated proposes to secure the people on all they have," declared Mr. McBride, "there will be no damage suits because everything will be settled with the drawing up of the

settled with the drawing up of the contracts.

"I don't see how there could be a fairer proposition than that which has been made to the farmers located within a radius of five miles of the proposed smelter site. The Utah Consoildated has agreed on values of the surrounding properties and provided any damages accrue the company agrees at any time to purchase the property from the owners at the stipulated price. I believe that the farmers will remain and reap the benefits because from the location of the smelters I do not think that any damages will follow. It is the fairest possible understanding for it allows the owners of property to derive all the benefits from their land and also retain their holdings as a speculative investment because values will undoubtedly soar with the advent of such a large industry bringing a small army of new residents into the district.

"The company pays the landowners

a small army of new residents into the district.

"The company pays the landowners 10 per cent of the valuation of their land down. This money is theirs and then should there be any dissatisfaction at any time in the future the company by its agreements undertakese to purchase the land outright, so you see that the farmer is absolutely protected.

"Mr. Risque also has told me that it is the intention of the company to employ 90 per cent white labor and with this object in view a line has been surveyed from Tooele City to the smelter site for the construction of a trolley railroad which will convey the employes to and from work. This means that Tooele City's population will be greatly augmented by a number of good citizens whose interests will be part and parcel with ours.

"The company has already purchased all the property it really needs and the surveys show that the plant will be erected within 15,000 feet of the Highland Boy mine."

Comes Up from Provo With J. William Knight on Smelter Business.

WORK GOING ON IN MINES.

Everything Moving Along Satisfactor\_ ily-Uintah Treasure Hill Mine.

Jesse Knight, the "Wizard of Tintic," is in the city today accompanied by his son, J. William Knight, on business connected with the building of the new smelter in the Tintic district. "We are going right along with the work of construction," said "Uncle" Jesse today, "notwithstanding the rumor circulated in Salt Lake yesterday to the effect that we had sold out to the effect that we had sold out to the American Smelting & Refining companny. I can only repeat what I have already said about this report—that there is nothing to it and that the representatives of the American company have never even approached us on the subject. We are building this smelter and we believe that it is going to be a success.

"Everything is moving along at the mines in about the usual manner with nothing of especial importance to report. However, things are very satisfactory at all the properties being worked,"

"What about the Treasure Hill at Park City?" was asked.

"It hasn't been decided yet just when we will resume development work there, but it will probably be in the near future. We got into a bad mess up there, and it has been quite a job to get titles straightened out. But this has been accomplished after considerable trouble; so we can go ahead now with development almost any time. John Dern and other Salt Lake people are heavily interested in the Treasure Hill, and, of course, they will be consulted before the order to start development work is given."

The Treasure Hill property is to be opened through the Creole shaft, which places the company in position to reach its ofe bodies quickly. In Park City, Treasure Hill, particularly since its consolidation with the Creole and Kentucky groups, is regarded as being a very attractive proposition.

#### DEPOSITS OF KAOLIN.

Basis for An Important Industry Lo. cated in Cedar Valley.

A company is to be formed to operate the kaolin depositss in Cedar valley west of Utah lake, and to establish in this city a large porcelain and enamel brick factory. The prime movers in the enterprise are Charles T. Hicks, president and general manager of the Hicks Clay company, of Drake, Ill., and Homer J. Kendall of the Zeb Kendall Brokerage company at Goldfield.

The promoters of the new company have recently secured control of the kaolin deposits referred to, and propose to make use of this form of clay in the manufacture of porcelain brick, In addition, the company will also ship and sell this clay to manufacturers of china products all over the world. The deposit in the Cedar valley is one of the four known deposits of kaolin in America. The other three are in Georgia, Ffordia and South Carolina, Mr. Hicks, who is an expert and the largest clay shipper in the world, says that the kaolin in Cedar valley is of much better quality than any found elsewhere in the United States and the equal of any in the world.

Kaolin is disintegrated feldspar and is extensively used in the manufacture of the finest of chinaware. The greatest quantity of the substance is found in China, although there are large deposits in France and England. It is of such a quality that it may be moulded into the thinnest of chinaware, such as the Haviland and Dresden ware, which is made from kaolin.

Some months ago the deposit in Cedar valley was discovered. It occur-

which is made from kaolin. Some months ago'the deposit in Cedar valley was discovered. It occupled nearly 1,500 acres of land hitherto considered worthless. Through the agency of Homer J. Kendall 540 acres of this land was purchased and options secured on 1,000 acres more. The matter was brought to the attention of Mr. Hicks and he came to Utah at once from Illinois. He looked over the ground and was delighted with the showing. He estimated that the deposits contain 20,000,000 tons of kaolin, which sells on the coast for \$18.50 a ton.

The availability of this bed of kaolin for use in the manufacture of porceiain and enamel brick occurred to Mr. Hicks, and after more investigation he concluded to establish a large factory in Sait Lake for the manufacture of this brick. He has planned to build a brick plant in Sait Lake at a cost of \$250,000 for the building and machinery. This plant, he announced yesterday, will be built during the pres-

Local Dealers Gratified That Mann Measure Before Congress is Changed.

that the Mann bill before Congress, pro-hibiting the sale of alfalfa seed with which clover seed is mixed, has been changed so as to largely avoid the con fusion it would be sure to occasion were the proposed legislation to become efthe proposed legislation to become effective. As there may be other features considered objectionable, a committee of local hay and grain men will give the amended bill a careful examination, and if there are any such features left, a concerted effort will be made to secure a further change in the bill before it is put upon its passage. Dealers say, there is no harm whatever in the presence of clover seed among the alfaffa seed, and the mixture is not considered among the catagory of adulterations. Alfalfa seed is selling at 15 cents per pound; but if the Mann bill should become a law, as originally intended, it would send the prise up materially, and then paralize the industry. Absolute pure alfalfa seed can be raised by special cultivation, but it sells for 20 cents. Utah is shipping alfalfa seed to foreign countries, so that a great business has been built up here, and anything attempted at legislation calculated to injure it at once arouse a strenuous opposition in this section.
