Editors Deseret News.

Brother E. Eldredge and myself left Salt Lake City October last, to perform a mission to this State. We first went to Columbia City, Whitley County, and there staid about three months, during which time we held 22 meetings; but, finding little encouragement to continue our labors there, we decided to come to this part of the State, having received a letter from Brother George Nebeker informing us that there were good opportunities for preaching the gospel here.

We arrived at Johnsonville, Warren County, about the first of February, and held several meetings in said place. We were received very kindly by several families, and made welcome to their homes. After staying a short time at Johnsonville we came to Covington, and have also found some good friends in the person of Mr. Oliver Shelby and others. Mr. Shelby's father received the Elders of the Church some 30 odd years ago, and his son is following in the footsteps of his venerable predecessor, and may God bless all those who have ministered to the wants of his servants.

Bro. Eldredge and myself continued to labor in Fountain and Warren Counties, and had held 55 meetings up to May 10th, when Bro. E. was released to return home on account of failing health. Since his departure I have been laboring alone, and have held 20 meetings and baptized two young men, both of whom had paid some little attention to the principles of life some four years ago when Elders Morgan and Standing were here.

There are several who are investigating the principles of Mormonism (so called), and I have every reason to believe they will soon join the Church.

Our meetings are all well attended, and, with one exception, have all passed off quietly and orderly.

Covington is pleasantly situated on the east bank of the Wabash, and contains some 1,800 inhabitants. The moral appearance of the place cannot be very highly spoken of, for here, as elsewhere, are to be found all the attending vices that characterize modern "Christian" civilization, such as drinking saloons (of which there are 10), billiard halls, bagnios, gambling dens, etc. One hears the most common conversation carried on, intermingled with oaths of every description; and many who indulge in this bad language are professed Christians too. I am told on good authority, that in nine cases out of ten you cannot find a young man 21 years of age that is virtuous. Surely this is "a wicked and adulterous generation," and although there are five churches of various kinds here, their "precepts of men" have done but little towards keeping vice from their midst. Of course there are many honest in heart to be found yet; and it is to be hoped that such will find the "truth" and gather out from these infatuated "Sodomites." I feel well on this my first mission, also that God has blessed me with His Spirit. Ever praying for the spread of "truth," and the prosperity of Zion, I am yours fraternally,

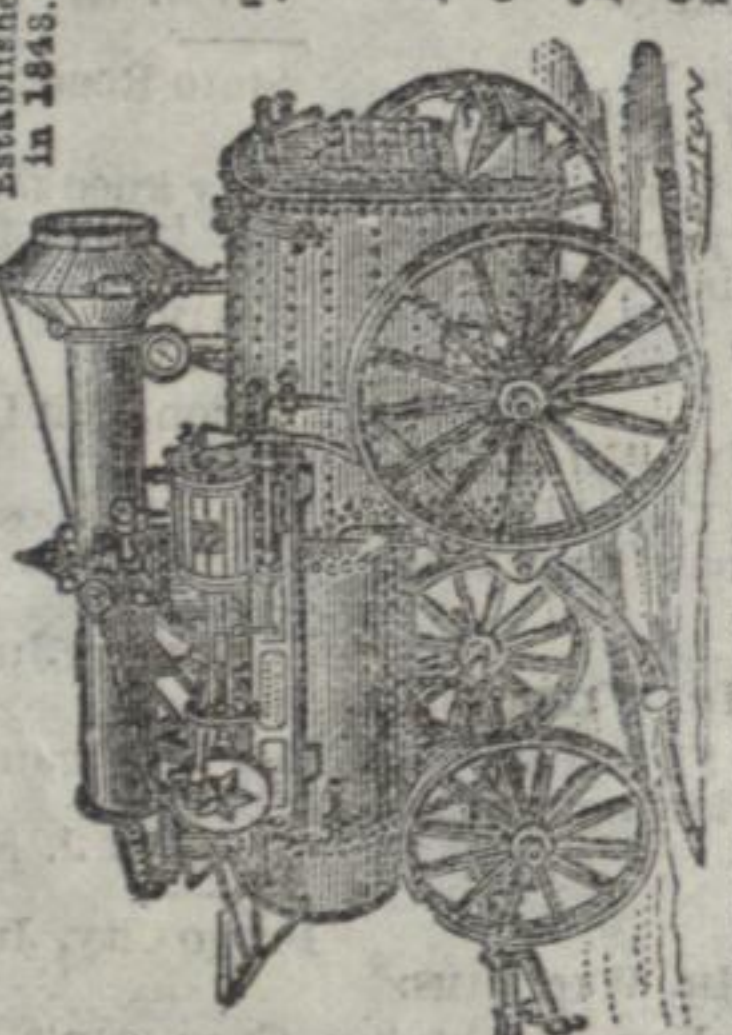
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
