AMERICAN.

Washington, 10. - The President
will make a short visit to Fort
Monroe next week. He is feeling
somewhat indisposed, and takes the
trip for the benefit of his health.

Early this spring Gen. Sherman
goes to San Francisco, there em-
barking with a few friends on a
cruise of a month or two along the
coast of California, Oregon and Mex-
ico.

Liberian advice: Emigrants sent
to Liberia under the auspices of the
American Colonization Society land-
ed at Monrovia, December 18th.

President Gardner has resigned on
account of ill health. Vice-Presi-
dent Russell succeeds to the office.

Secretary Chandler has resigned the
Naval Advisory Board to proceed
at once to prepare plans for the
five new United States vessels pro-
vided for by Congress, consisting of
three steel cruisers and two torpedo
boats; also, to arrange for the com-
pletion and repair of the four unfin-
ished monitors. It is given out in
Washington that the contract will be
completed in two months.

Theodore F. Singler, is still un-
der bond for the performance of the
duties of the office of Secretary of
the Treasury, Lawrence, holds that
until his accounts are settled he can-
not draw his salary as Director of
the Treasury. Singler decides that there
is nothing to prevent his drawing
his salary, and will pay it as it be-
comes due.

The question whether the Treas-
ury Department can legally with-
hold payment of members of Con-
gress who are indebted to the Gov-
ernment in existing considerable in-
debtedness. The First Comptroller of
the Treasury assumes it can, and so
informed the Secretary in the case
of Representative Ochiltree.

The Solicitor of the Treasury is in-
clined to doubt the legality of such
decision. Secretary Folger now has
the question under consideration.

Charges have been filed against
Superior Architect Hill, and the
Secretary of the Treasury is now
considering the best method of in-
vestigating them. A list of the
charges is being prepared. It is said
that the charges are of a serious na-
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FRANCISCO.

San Francisco, 10. - A storm which
refused to leave five months ago. San
Francisco and many other from that
city and along the whole coast of
California wrote me many months
ago, asking if a storm and tidal
wave would be there. I replied in
distinct terms that they were in the
safest part of the world, for the
storm would originate west of them,
and come directly away from them,
and would be prevented from reach-
ing them from the east by the
Rocky Mountains. The Professor

letter. In conclusion he said he had
done his duty both to himself and
the public.

The Railroads.

DODGE CITY, Kan., 10. - The round
house of the Atchafalpa, Topoka &
Santa Fe Railroad burned last
night. Two locomotives were
destroyed; loss about \$50,000.

New York, 10. - Vice-President
Coke informed a reporter to-day that
the contract for a new vessel for
Portland and Kalamazoo has been signed,
with J. B. Montgomery & Co. of Port-
land, a length of 40 miles, to be
completed September 1st. The
Colombia river will be crossed by
an iron ferry boat, capable of carry-
ing thirty cars at once, and which
has been kept in operation for
Portland, to arrive September 1st.

The ferry will be worked like that
at Havre de Grace on the Penn-
sylvania road, some years ago. Be-
