AMERICAN.

OMAHA, 7.—The river still continues to rise. The bottom lands between here and Council Bluffs are almost entirely covered with water. It has fallen some two feet at Sioux City, and is rising above there.

COLUMBIA, S. C., 7.—Gov. Chamberlain was interviewed by an Associated Press agent, on his arrival, to-day, as to his intentions for the future. He said he could not state details, as he had not had time to consider them, but in general did not regard the withdrawal of the troops as affecting his legal rights. Whatever effect it might have on his practical ability to maintain them, it would probably be his duty to hold his office until removed from it by force. In answer to the inquiry as to his course if Hampton should convene the legislature immediately, he said he could only say he intended to pursue a course consistent with a firm belief in the justice of his position and cause without regard to personal consequences.

NEW YORK, 7.

The World's Washington special says there seems to be no doubt that Chamberlain has reconsidered his determination to step down and out of the State House of South Carolina as soon as the troops are removed from there on Tuesday. He has decided to await the result of the issue in New Orleans, and seems to take courage from Packard's bids of defiance to the administration. This will compel Hampton to take the case into the courts to secure Chamberlain's ejection from the State House, though it will prove a matter of form and of brief delay. The whole southern policy is awakening a better feeling among many of the republicans.

WASHINGTON, 7.—The Attorney-General, in a circular letter to the United States district attorneys, says the appropriation for the expenses of the United States Courts for the fiscal year is nearly exhausted. Congress refused to appropriate for these expenses, and hence the strictest economy is necessary on the part of the United States attorneys.

District Attorney Wells, to-day, with the approval of the Attorney-General, entered a *nolle prosequi* in Don Platt's case of seditious writing.

PHILADELPHIA, 8.

The captain of the schooner which rescued Maguire from the *Roanoke* states that he never contradicted his first statement regarding the disaster that when taken off the brig he was nearly exhausted. He regards the rumor of the mutiny and murder of the captain and passengers entirely without foundation.

SCRANTON, 8.—Jos. P. Connor, a prominent citizen of Columbia Co., was drowned, together with his wife, in the Upper Line Ridge. While driving home from church the horse took fright, and rushing down a steep bank, leaped into the canal.

LEBANON, Pa., 8.—Mrs. Sydney Miller, wife of Joseph S. Miller, who was murdered near here last week, has been committed by the coroner to answer the charge of murder.

The President appointed W. G. Tower register of the land office at Evanston, Wyoming.
