

## JAPANESE PRESS ON TOKIO RIOTS.

Some Think Them Very Significant, Saying Cabinet's Only Course is to Resign.

### THEY AVOID USE OF WORD "MOB"

Action of Police in Closing Hibaya Park Condemned—Sympathize With Destruction of Police Stations.

Tokio, Wednesday, Sept. 6, 8 a. m.—(Delayed in transmission.)—With the exception of the Kookunin, the government organ, the newspapers this morning generally express anger over the action of the police in closing Hibaya park and attempting to suppress meetings. They say the measures of the police were unwarranted and foolish, and served to excite the crowds.

The Jiji says: "Such a deplorable phenomenon in a city where the emperor resides is highly significant and the only course open to the cabinet is resignation."

The Hoshi deplores such occurrences in the capital of a victorious country and says that Tokyo has been converted into a city of the damned. It further urges a refusal to ratify the treaty of peace which it says is the sole cause for the shameful and sad occurrences.

The Mainichi says: "Hear the voice of the nation. Heed the expression of the nation's desires. The nation's voice is the voice of God."

The resignation of the cabinet might appear popular indignation. All the papers avoid the use of the word "mob," and only sympathize with the destruction of the police stations.

### MOR AGAIN AT WORK.

Tokio, Wednesday, Sept. 6, 8:30 p. m.—(Delayed in transmission.)—The city was quiet throughout the day, although there was excitement and a tendency to rioting everywhere manifested. Nightfall brought a verification of the prediction of renewed trouble. The streets in the center of the city were filled with crowds. The first disturbance occurred in the vicinity of the residence of minister of home affairs, Yoshikawa. A mob again attempted to fire a structure, but was restrained by the guards.

Unbearable roughness and fighting followed. Mobs gathered in the neighborhood of the metropolitan police headquarters. They refrained from attack on account of the presence of a strong police reserve.

The passage of street cars through the crowd caused the police to attack and they began attacking and destroying cars. They drove off the crowds and passengers and set fire to the cars. Two large cars were speedily destroyed and an outbreak occurred in the Kanda district of the city where a fire was started.

Because of popular animosity, largely directed toward the police, street cars have been withdrawn and the police have been ordered to the danger zones. The withdrawal of the patrol cars has been regarded as a serious step. It is believed that the number of arrests will be large. They are on charges of gunning, looting, and rioting. The rioters' description has been resolved to defend all arrested for charge.

The number of persons known to have been killed thus far is six.

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### BERMUDEZ ASHPHALT CO. CASE

State Department Receives Full Text of Decision of Venezuelan Court of Last Instance.

Washington, Sept. 7.—The state department was today placed in possession of the full text of the recent decision of the Venezuelan court of last instance concerning the judgment of the same court sitting as a tribunal of Venezuela in the case of the Bermudez Asphalt Company against the state of Venezuela.

The decision was transmitted through the Venezuelan legation here and last before Arthur Secoy, of State, by the legation of the state of Venezuela.

The effect of the decision, to rescind the company's contract and condemn it to the state of Venezuela, was rendered August 1 last. The decision presented a grave question of either side to the controversy. When the suit was brought, the company claimed that it was entitled to the property and it is understood that the government continues.

## M. WITTE TALKS OF AMERICA AND RUSSIA

Are the Two Great Countries of the World Because They Produce Men and Material.

### SECRET OF A NATION'S SUCCESS

Czar's Country is Much Misunderstood in United States—And the Latter in Nicholas's

New York, Sept. 8.—"America and Russia are almost like the far famed Siamese twins," said Sergius Witte, the Russian peace envoy, in an interview published today by the Herald.

"The two great countries of the world," he continued, "are Russia and the United States. They are the two great countries of the world because they both produce men and material. This is the secret of any nation's success."

Asked if he thought Russia's commercial condition had been bettered or injured by the war, M. Witte said: "Russia is better now than she ever was. After the war she will get on her feet again, and when she is on her feet it will be a firm and strong position that she takes. We have the men, the money and the people. We have the greatest undeveloped country that exists. Our climate ranges from the tropics to the arctic."

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Los Angeles to Issue Bonds. Los Angeles, Cal., Sept. 7.—The proposition to issue \$1,500,000 of municipal bonds for the acquisition of a city water supply from Owens river, in Inyo county, was carried in the city by an overwhelming majority. The total vote was 11,447, 10,693 for and 754 against.

The distance from the headwaters of the Owens river to Los Angeles is about 240 miles. The entire proposition is estimated by experts to cost about \$21,500,000, and it will require from three to four years to complete it.
