

KANAB STAKE CONFERENCE.

The Quarterly Conference of the Kanab Stake of Zion, convened at the Kanab School-house, Kanab, Kane County, Utah, Saturday, Dec. 8th, 1877, at 10 a. m.

Present on the stand, James L. Bunting of the presidency of the Stake and the bishops of the various wards with their counselors.

Meeting called to order by Prest. Jas. L. Bunting. Singing and prayer.

Prest. Jas. L. Bunting remarked that he rejoiced with the Saints that we could meet here in conference in peace and health.

W. D. Johnson, Jr., was proposed as clerk of the conference, which was unanimously sustained.

Bro. Samuel Mulliner spoke of the condition of the people of Orderville, and of the principles of the United Order; felt that the people at that place were much ahead of many of the Saints, as they kept the commandments of God in living in the U. O., and were trying to do right.

Elder Royal Cutler addressed the Saints for a short time in relation to our temporal duties.

Bishop H. B. M. Jolley gave a report of the Mt. Carmel Ward—spoke also of the equality of mankind. Thought the Lord gave his children talents and powers to fit them for the stations they are to occupy, and as we are all different in mind and body it was impossible for us to all become equal.

President Jas. L. Bunting spoke a few moments. Choir sang. Benediction.

Afternoon, 2 p. m.

President E. Snow, Elders Henry Eyring, M. T. Farnsworth and Lester J. Hendricks arrived from St. George during the recess.

President E. Snow presiding. Singing and prayer.

Elder Henry Eyring addressed the people in relation to the duties we owe to God, ourselves and our children; exhorted the people to renewed diligence in carrying out the counsels of the priesthood whom God has placed upon the earth to guide and direct his people; spoke of his recent mission to Switzerland and of the difference in the condition of the people in that country and this.

President E. Snow called upon the clerk to read the statistical report of this Stake of Zion, which was done.

Elder Thos. Robertson was called upon to give a report of Orderville Ward, as Bishop Chamberlain and his counselors were not present.

Elder Richard Robinson gave a report of Upper Kanab Ward, stated it was a ranching country; he had been unable to keep up the Sabbath meetings; had Sunday school during summer.

President E. Snow said he was well pleased to hear the general good report from the different wards in this Stake of Zion; seemed particularly pleased with the report from Orderville; felt to bless the people for their self denial and obedience to the requirements of the priesthood; spoke at length of the follies of the saints and also of our duties in building temples paying tithing, etc., and gave much good instruction.

Choir sang. Benediction.

Sunday, Dec. 9, 10 a. m.

Elder M. F. Farnsworth gave a report of his works in the Temple at St. George, explaining several principles of great interest to the saints; spoke of the importance of our laboring for our dead, and the blessing that will attend that work.

Elder Henry Eyring spoke of the "Last Days" mentioned by the Prophet Isaiah; also of the scattering of the house of Israel.

President E. Snow followed upon the same subject; spoke of the sons of Jacob, their blessings, powers, promises, etc.; made many quotations from the Bible, making an interesting discourse upon the tribes of Israel; gave particulars in regard to the blessings conferred upon Ephraim and Manasseh, and how they were being fulfilled every day; urged the people to live up to their duties and obligations so that they could go and obtain their blessings in the Temple.

Choir sang. Benediction.

2 p. m.

Singing and prayer. The sacrament was administered.

Bishop James Leithead reported the condition of the Glendale Ward; gave some good suggestions in relation to home industry.

Bishop S. E. Johnson gave a report of the Johnson Ward.

President Snow offered a few remarks on the general welfare of the saints in this Stake of Zion.

THE FACTORY FIRE AT BRIGHAM CITY.

BRIGHAM CITY, Dec. 21st, 1877.

Editors Deseret News:

Dear Sir—Last night about two o'clock the citizens of this place were awakened from their peaceful slumber by the cry of fire, and were immediately attracted to the woolen factory on the Box Elder, the frame addition on the east end of which had taken fire through some cause which is yet a mystery to all, as care was always taken in every respect to guard against such an occurrence. Mr. John Laird, the spinner, had walked through the buildings at 11 o'clock, and seen all fire out before that time, in every place. Sleeping there, he was awakened by the outburst of smoke and gave the alarm. About the same time Mr. R. Caboon, night guardman, ran through town and cried fire, while City Marshal C. C. Loveland arose and ran to the Court House and rang the bell before dressing himself. The fire very soon reached the roof and the ceiling of the main building, and aided by a breeze, soon inflamed the whole building. The appearance, though sad, bordered on the sublime. At this time all efforts to extinguish the fire were unavailable. In a very few minutes this solid and noble structure (the factory) was a wreck, leaving only

crumbling walls standing. Loss in machinery \$10,000, building and appendages \$25,000, wool, washed and cleaned for use 7,000 pounds. Three narrow looms and one broad loom were saved and some warp and cloth amounting to but little value. A. C.
