Latter Will Conduct the Business in **Orpheum Theater Building--- Has** Faith in Salt Lake.

Possessing unbounded faith in Salt Lake's business future, believing that this city is to be the big distributing point for the intermountain country, and desiring to join with the forces at work here to boost Salt Lake, Mr. John H. Denhalter of Provo has purchased the soda water business from Hewlett Bros. company, and will locate in this

city. This important business transaction has just been consummated. The price paid for the plant was not given out. but it runs well into the thousands, and means that an additional outlay of capital will be made,

WHAT MR. HEWLETT SAYS.

When seen this morning and asked the reason for closing out this branch of the business, Air. O. H. Hewlett ex-plained that his firm was fully alive to the necessity of specialization, and that they had disposed of their soda water business in order to provide more room, and to devote all their time and atten-tion to their other lines. "Our other lines have increased so rapidly during the past two years,"

"Our other lines have increased so rapidly during the past two years," said Mr, Hewiett, "that we find it nec-essary to give our entire time and at-tention to them, and then, we need more room. Here to the north of our present plant we are now constructing a three-story building that will more than double our present capacity, but even this will not be sufficient when the spring business fully onens up and so spring business fully opens up, and so the soda water business had to go, but we are pleased to have found a pur-chaser who will be just as successful, we believe, as we have been, and who will serve the public of the intermountain country, just as faithfully as we have tried to do."

Mr. John H. Denhalter is a Utah man Mr. John H. Denhaiter is a Utah man and has been in the soda water busi-ness for the past 30 years. He has made Provo his home, and although he does not intend to close out his busi-ness in that city, he feels that every-thing points to Salt Lake as the big distributing point of the intermountain country for the future, and hence the necessity of his making this city his permanent headquarters. Mr. Denhalter has a temporary home for the new concern, but it is under-stood that he will secure a lease on one of the big stores and basement in the
