Ogden, Oct. 20 .- During the past four days the beet growers of this district have been unable to get their beets to the factory on account of the inclement weather. On Thursday of last week weather. On Thursday of last week the farmers had to cease digging beets in this district as the roads throughout the county were almost impassable. The factory is running on beets that have been stored in the bins and that are being received from the northern part of Salt Lako valley and which were loaded prior to the storm. In some parts of Weber county, where the beets were already dug an effort will be made to get them to the factory im-mediately. mediately.

The Logan and Lewiston factories are having no difficulty at present in keeping good supplies of beets on hand. While the roads in Cache valley have been somewhat broken up by the hea-vy traffic it has not been such as to in-terfere with the setting of the beets to terfere with the getting of the beets to the factories

As was announced in the "News" several days ago, the actual construc-tion work has commenced upon the new moving picture house which is to be errected on Washington avenue south of the Grand Opera house by W.
