in small towns, passed, with 28 ayes and nays. S. H. 63, making it a misdemeanor to

interrupt an electric current by gross negligence, and imposing a fine not ex-ceeding \$1,000 or imprisonment in the penitentiary for one year or both, for wilfully and maliciously damaging an electrical line, passed, with 12 nays. The misdemeanor clause was stricken out. S.
