Gorky is quite well, and is subjected only to the ordinary regulations of prisoners in the fortress which require the wearing of a special garb to pre-vent the possibility of escape. The As-sociated Press is informed on the best authority that the prison fare and ac-commodations at the fortress are better than at any other prison in St. Petersburg, several of which are mod-els of their kind. Prisoners in the fort-

els of their kind. Prisoners in the fort-ress are confined in roomy, well heated casemates and exercised daily. The stories of terrible hardships and pri-vations are said to be baseless. The chief reason for the dread of being confined in the fortress is due to the fact that an inmate is unable in any way to communicate with his fellow way to communicate with his fellow prisoners, the casemates being soundproof.

The Associated Press representative talked with Madame Gorky, who ap-parently is not deeply worried. After her interview with her husband on Tuesday she petitioned the commandant of the fortress that M. Gorky be allowed to wear ordinary clothes and use writing materials, but she said to the Associated Press that her husband was not anxious to write. "What is the use of writing," he told

her, "when, according to the fortress degulations, what I write must be burned when I leave?"

Washington, Feb. 8.-Atty.-Gen. Moody has addressed the following Moody has addressed the following communication to all districts attor-neys, marshals and others employed in or under the department of justice: "It has come to my attention that in the past, as well as at the present time, district attorneys and marshals and their subordinates have been employed in that respective states as attorneys in their respective states as attorneys or otherwise in promoting or organiz-ing the enactment of laws by the state legislatures. The work of legislative counsel, where no improper motives are used, is recognized as a profes-sional duty which may properly be per-formed, by counsel. But it is believed that such work ought not to be undertaken by those who hold federal office. Therefore, district attorneys, assistant district attorneys, clerks to the district attorneys. LAWYER PATRICK'S CASE.

Millionaire Rice's Murderer Hopes

To Get a New Trial.

New York, Feb. 9.--Lawyer Albert T. Patrick, under sentence of death in Sing Sing for the murder of millionaire William M. Rice, who succeeded in placing before the Medico Legal society of this city for its investigation a ques-tion on which he believes rests the whole fabric of appeal for a new trial, has been informed through his counsel of the society's agreement to pass on the question.

The society disclaimed any interest in the matter outside of strictly medico

legal questions involved, and has ap-pointed a committee to enter on an in-vestigation. A report is expected Feb.

Patrick's new defense proposes to attack the evidence on which he was convicted, the prosecution proving that Rice died of congestion of the lungs,

induced by chloroform poisoning. By exhaustive medical research Patrick claims to have discovered that em-

balming, under certain conditions, will cause congestion of the lungs. He ar-gues that the evidence based upon the congestion of Ride's lungs, is, therefore, worthless, and submits 11 questions, 10

of them on the above point. The last question reads: "State whether from all the evidence the death

of Rice resulted, in your opinion, from the administration or inhalation of cloroform and the reasons and basis of your conclusion."
