The World's Fair committee met last evening in special session at the rooms of the secretary in the Commercial Building.

The secretary presented his report of his recent visit to Chicago and the business transacted. The report, brief, stated that in personage of importance, he had a conference with Mr. G. F. Moore, Aug. 25, when the names of contractors and the amount of their bills were read to the Executive Committee Company. Harton & Son being the lowest, the committee accepted their bid. In a subsequent communication of instructions received by wire and written notice was given Messrs. Harton & Son and the contractor drawn and the bid presented on the 1st of September. The contractors did not accept the bid, and the work was postponed to the fall of the year. The contractors engaged by the officials here have commenced work at once.

The action of the secretary was approved, the cost of the contractors approved, and the bill for \$1,000 for expenses last evening by the committee. The plans for the Utah building have been highly praised by all the officials in Chicago. Chiefly because in the first terms regarding them say they have considered the building up standards and importance for Utah.

The Utah site is in a matter of comment, some of the other states being unable to compete with what has been done in the execution of the Utah plan. The States nearly, practically all of their ground, with their buildings, several of them being obliged to cut down their buildings to fit their sites. The buildings are built on a level, a beautiful grove of shade trees on the west. Only three of the numerous shade trees have to be cut down to make room for the Utah building.

The contractors say that they have put no money into their buildings and are cut short so their contracts to order to build and furnish their buildings.

The reports from the several chiefs of departments on the work of selecting and preparing the Utah work is now well under way.

Columbus Anniversary.

Just at this time of year, 60 years ago, Christopher Columbus landed his wonderful crew of discoverers against expectations, and discovered a new world. He did it well, for he travelled on Friday, discovered land on Friday, and several other remarkable things on the same day and proved for the second time that the land near the equator was habitable. He had proved it already in his famous discussion with the learned council of Salamanca.

He did not sail Aug. 3, however, or discover land Oct. 12, as all the schoolbooks say, for he left in the Fifteenth century that, and they reckoned by old style, and as nine days must be added to every date to make it square with the sun, plus the time of Jason Townsend's "Alvarez" of today. President Harrison and the World's Columbian exposition managers have properly recognized this and have considered the building up of Columbus and explorer.
