

COOK NOT WORRIED BY BARRILL'S TALK

Any One Taking Trouble Can Find
Doctor's Records on Top of
Mount McKinley.

ENEMIES ARE USING MONEY

Thinks It Scarcely Worth While to
Pay Attention to Talk
About McKinley Trip.

Atlantic City, Oct. 14.—Expressing
astonishment at the statement of Ed-
ward Barrill, Dr. Cook today re-
marked that he had ascended to the
summit of Mount McKinley and said
further that if an expedition will fol-
low the route he took they will find the
records deposited by him at the sum-
mit of the mountain.

Referring to Barrill's sworn state-
ment, Dr. Cook said:
"I cannot really understand why
Barrill should have made such a state-
ment as the newspapers reproduced.
If he was acting under moral con-
ditions, I must say it surprises me. We
were always on the most friendly
terms. I know of the conditions
under which this alleged affidavit was
made. I will make no specific reply to
it. My account of the trip has been
published. For the present it is the
old statement of one man against an-
other."

"If an expedition of experienced
mountaineers will follow the route that
I took and will go to the top of Mount
McKinley they will find there the re-
cords which I deposited on attaining
the summit of the mountain in the
mountain described in my book, 'To the
Top of the Continent.'"

Dr. Cook later said:
"I never even knew Barrill kept a
diary. I never saw it, consequently I
could not have asked him to alter any-
thing whatever. The only thing I ever
saw him do was to take sketches. An-
statement of his that I suggested the
climbing of dates and altitudes is a
lie."

Dr. Cook declined to enter further
into the subject. He said he expected
soon to get into touch with Barrill,
when the whole matter will be ex-
plained.

Dr. Cook met with a hearty recep-
tion here. Several hundred persons
cheered him as he stepped out of the
station. A military guard of honor,
composed of the city troops, presented
arms as he entered his carriage and
the troops acted as the explorer's escort
throughout the city.

ENEMIES USING MONEY

Philadelphia, Oct. 14.—"We have
learned that money had been offered
for information regarding my ascent
of Mount McKinley," said Dr. Cook to-
day. "I have not paid any particular
attention to the talk regarding that
trip because I did not think it was
worth while."

"I will not speak of it until Barrill
returns east. He is coming east now.
Since my return to this country I have
had only a short message from him."

pictures from every possible view, but
many of them did not turn out well
and were not published."

Canada's arctic expert, declared today
that judging from the evidence pre-
sented, Dr. Cook had reached the pole
and his story was to be believed.
Speaking of the story against Dr. Cook,
Capt. Bernier said he took
no stock in it. He said he had heard
the story and would tell any story that
they thought would be agreeable to their listeners.

SHERIFF'S POSSE HAS FIGHT WITH HIGHGRADERS

Manhattan, Nov. 14.—In a battle
at the Stray Dog mine between a
band of "high graders" and a sher-
iff's posse, Deputy Sheriff Martinson
was wounded. It is believed that one
of the robbers was shot, but he was
carried away by his companion, who
escaped in the darkness with a large
quantity of rich ore.

The gang of "high graders" which
today succeeded in getting away with a
haul of rich ore at the Stray Dog mine,
near here, after wounding Deputy
Sheriff Martinson, was discovered at
work 220 feet below the surface by
the sheriff's posse.

The "high graders" passed into the
Stray Dog mine through an abandoned
shaft and thence through the Plam-
ana shaft to the Union Nine mine.
The lease from which the ore was
taken has been closed. A watchman
saw the light in the shaft and notified
the officers, who waited at the mouth
of the shaft for the members of the
gang to come out. A demand of Deputy
Sheriff Martinson for their surrender
was answered by a fusillade, and the
officer fell with a wound in his scalp.
The officers returned the fire and the
robbers dashed for the nearby timber,
dropping one sack of high grade ore
in their flight. Fifty shots were ex-
changed in the battle and it is be-
lieved that one of the robbers was hit.
Dense darkness prevailed and no de-
scription of the number or appearance
of the men could be obtained.
A posse is making a search for the
robbers.

TOO MUCH TALKING LEADS TO SHOOTING AND ARREST

Cleveland, Oct. 15.—Shot down by an
officer after a running revolver duel, a
man who says he is Martin Jerns, of
Detroit, was arrested last night as the
result of his folly in contradicting a
companion on a Superior avenue street
car upon the cleverness of "pulling off"
a robbery of a jewelry store in Genesee
street, Buffalo, N. Y., a few days ago.
Passengers were attracted to the pair
by their joking over the looting of the
Buffalo store, an account of which they
were reading in a newspaper. A Cleve-
land city employee got off the car with
the pair at Fifty-fifth street and notified
the police precinct in the vicinity.
Bicycle Patrolman Goodrich went in
pursuit. The pair separated, Jerns
opening fire with a revolver. In a running
battle, Goodrich brought down his
man with a bullet in his side. In
Jerns' possession were found four dia-
monds, \$300 in cash and a set of steel
saws. The companion escaped. A
reporting to telegrams from the chief of
police of Buffalo, the two men are
wanted for a jewelry store robbery.

SOLE SURVIVOR OF CREW FOUND UNCONSCIOUS

Miami, Fla., Oct. 15.—A deck hand,
sole survivor of the officers and crew
of the tug Sybil, which was wrecked
by the hurricane, has been found un-
conscious under a wheelbarrow. When
recovered, he said that when an 85
miles an hour wind wrecked the Sybil,
Capt. Parker, Engineer Fox, Pilot
Whitmer, Asst. Engineer Peterson and
seven deck hands grabbed life preservers
and leaped overboard, feet first, the
life preservers being around their feet
and holding their heads under water
until they were drowned.

JAPAN PREPARING FOR GREAT MANEUVERS

Victoria, B. C., Oct. 15.—News was
brought by the steamer Montevideo yester-
day that great preparations were
being made for the extensive man-
euvers of the Japanese army early next
month. More than 70,000 men will be
engaged. Military airplanes and wire-
less telegraph will be used. The ar-
tillery corps is being equipped with
new field and machine guns for the
occasion.
Lord Kitchener will be one of the
British representatives at the maneu-
ver and China also will send several
officers. strenuous efforts were being
made by Japanese officials in China to
force China to stop the threatened boy-
cott according to further advices
brought by the Montevideo. The Chi-
nese newspapers have been given an
intimation that they will be suppressed
if they advise their readers to use the
boycott.

Montevideo, says that the smuggling of
opium into the Philippines since the
sale and manufacture in the islands
has been forbidden, has been exten-
sive.

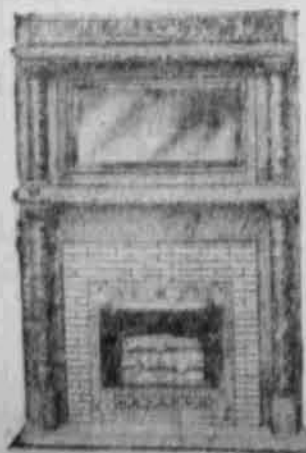
