Suppose there are 20,000 families in Utah, a great portion of whom are well to do, and no doubt many of them spend at least a hundred dollars a year, for things that are positively injurious to them. It would be safe to say at least twenty-five dollars on an average, for every family in Utah, is spent in this unwise manner every year. This money that is thus wasted—by say 20,000 families amounts to a million dollars per annum! and yet as "Adolphus" says, we claim to be a "struggling community." What is to prevent us as Latter-day Saints, from saving this money, and thus create a fund for home manufacture—and save ourselves—from our fast-approaching doom. The remedy lies within ourselves, and within easy reach. If we do not utilize it, we have no one to blame but ourselves. Then let us agitate it continually until it crystallizes into an accomplished reality. Let us awaken from our lethargy, and never say "fail."

We have organized facilities unequalled in the world for accomplishing this much-desired object, and we ought to be ashamed to say: "We can not do it."

If at first you don't succeed
Try, try, try, again.

We want nail factories, cheese factories, more glass works, railroad iron, stove foundries, and such things should be owned by the people, so that we can all receive the profits accruing therefrom. If we call on rich men to start these things they will receive the profits, whereas a grand system of true co-operation would benefit all investors. Can not we, as a community professing to be united, accomplish as much as people making no such pretensions? Gigantic mercantile institutions are made grand successes in Old England, by the mechanic and laborer, and this from people holding different views socially, politically and religiously. But they have united financially. Surely we can do the same, who have no social, religious or political dissensions.

Let us start again, and have true and genuine retrenchment organizations. Pardon me for suggesting that in my opinion it is unbecoming in either a lady or gentleman to adorn themselves in silks or velvets and attempt to address a retrenchment meeting. Example has greater weight than precept. I remember a lady stating she had listened to a discourse on retrenchment delivered by a sister who was dressed in silk and adorned with a fine gold chain. I think if we can not teach with our idols—we should lay them aside on such occasions; for, to say the least, it is inconsistent. Many poor persons not so blest with this world's goods, feel sensitive at witnessing such gaudy displays and are apt to think it is only burlesquing with their time and patience. Let us, as Latter-day Saints, try to overcome these weaknesses, and consider the momentous importance of the times we are living in. We must learn to adorn ourselves with humility in dress, and take the money foolishly lavished at milliners' and dressmakers', and place it where it will be a solid benefit to all.

Are not the times, too, pregnant with weightier matters? Let us, not call on rich men to help us, when we are amply able to help ourselves. Let us, by all means, organize at once, and who is there among the sensible and intelligent that will not admire our wives and sisters and love them the more for their noble sacrifice in this direction. What do they care for either the approval or disapproval of their enemies. Let them learn to despise their abominable fashions, as they do their filthy and corrupt social practices which, like a cancerous tumor, are eating out the vitals of the nation.

My remarks are addressed more particularly to the ladies because they are the housekeepers—and where is the man that could refuse the gentle pleadings of his wife, or could break the word of wisdom if his wife kept it. Let us try Adolphus' plan, unless a better one can be suggested. Lead off, sisters, and the honor will be yours. Count not the teachers on the various blocks collect the funds thus saved and give receipts in a memorandum book, and the proceeds to the Bishop to be deposited in the bank. I tell you we could accomplish wonders this way. Do not let the thing drop, but agitate it! agitate it! Who will be first to lead off? Our temporal salvation is at stake. The evening is upon us—"Who would be free, himself must strike the blow." Let us not wait until too late and then say "who would have thought it?"

In conversation with several butter makers recently (who all agree as to the evil effects of glutting the market for a season at an unremunerative price to the producer) the question was asked, as to how the evil could be remedied and cheese produced instead by a co-operative dairy system, so that our farmers could receive the full benefit of their product instead of wasting a great portion as at present? The great difficulty seemed to be the gathering of the milk from the farmers—they being somewhat scattered in the settlements. I will suggest a plan that I think could be adopted, unless a still better one can be offered: Let each family provide itself with milk cans, similar to those used by vendors in the city. Have the milk ready at a regular time. Let each farmer take turns to call for it, and take it to the dairy. The expense of building the dairy would be a mere bagatelle, with a lot of well-to-do farmers and would soon repay its cost, and we would have one solid cash article for exportation to begin with. Can we not start a simple thing like this—and if not—why not? Let some practical, experienced men answer. Many thousands of dollars are wasted annually by neglecting this industry.

It is reported that the negro had ravished the twelve-year-old daughter of Vince Moore, a respectable rancher, and was hanged by the indignant ranchers.
