FAYETTE. LACK OF WATER SYSTEM. Opportunities Lost by People of Warm Creek.

Special Correspondence.

Fayette, Sanpete Co., July 14 .-- This place is five miles north of Gunnison, is sometimes called Warm Creek, after the warm spring stream that supplies the town and district with water. This water rises from springs in the j hills about three-fourths of a mile east of the town. It is beautiful, clear, wholesome water and it rises about 75 feet above the town. Though this place has been settled for over 40 years, the people have never geen united enough to pipe this water, yet it would be a very light task and would give the people excellent water for culinary pur-Now all the drinking water HUSES, comes from the flithy open ditches, and though sweet and pure at the fountain head. It is filthy and swampy tasting out of the ditches and must be detramential to health. With the outlay of perhaps \$1,000 in cash for material, and the rest in labor, this water could be piped to the town, put into the houses and give the people a blessed bean of good drinking water and offer protection from fire. It would be a frai saving of time, water and exfrom the springs could be gathered ina pipe system and carried to points distribution, as it would save the freat loss by seepage and evapora-
