The detective was thus able to regain his feet and utilize his own weapon. He fired to shots from an automatic pistil, nearly all of which took effect. There was nothing on the dead man by which he could be identified. Barbee was not hit by the only shot the thief fired at him.

He was bern in Pennsylvania and was graduated from Ann Arbor univer-sity in 1555, being the last surgeon in the cases. He served as a surgeon in the comfoderate army, Comfus to Colorado, in 1956, he was one of the first three white men to astite in Trinidad.
