THE GOLD BILL.

We are happy to learn that our numerous readers, as well as the commercial public, are relieved from the restraints placed upon them by that miserable contrivance the "Gold Act," which by the subjoined it appears was wiped out of existence on the 24 ult. [Editor News.]

AN ACT

To repeal the act of the seventeenth of June, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, prohibiting the sales of gold and foreign exchange.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the act entitled "An act to prohibit certain sales of gold and foreign exchange," approved June seven-teen, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, be and the same is hereby repealed.

FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND MORE MEN CALLED FOR BY THE PRESIDENT.

WASHINGTON, July 18th, 1864.

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA: A PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, by the act, approved July 4th, 1864, entitled "An act further to regulate and provide for the enrolling, and calling out the national forces and for other purposes," it is provided that the President of the United States may, at his discretion, at any time hereafter, call for any number of men as volunteers for the respective terms of one, two, and three years for military service, and that in case the quota or any part thereof, of any town, township, ward of a city, precinct, or election district, or of a county, not so subdivided, shall not be filled within the space of fifty days after such call, then the President shall immediately order a draft for one year to fill such quota, or any part thereof which may be fulfilled.

And whereas, the new enrollment heretofore ordered is now so far completed as that the aforementioned act of Congress may now be put in operation for recruiting and keeping up the strength of the armies in the field, for garrisons and such military operations as may be required for the purpose of suppressing the rebellion and restoring the authority of the United States Government in the insurgent States; Now, therefore, I, Abraham Lincoln, President of the United States, do issue this my call for five hundred thousand volunteers for military service, provided, nevertheless, that all credits which may be established under section eight of the aforesaid act, an account of persons who have entered the naval service during the present rebellion, and by credits for men furnished to the military service in excess of calls heretofore made for volunteers, shall be accepted under this call for one, two or three years, as they may elect and will be entitled to the bounty provided by law for the period of service for which they enlist.

And I hereby proclaim order and direct, that immediately after the 5th day of September, 1864, being fifty days from the date of this call, a draft for troops to serve for one year shall be held in every town, township, ward of a city, precinct, election district, or a county, not so subdivided, to fill up the quota which shall be assigned to it under this call, or any part thereof, which may be unfilled by

volunteers on the said 5th day of September, 1864.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set [L. S.] my hand and cause the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington, the 18th day of July, in the year of Our Lord, 1864, and of the independence of the United States the 89th.

Recognizance forfeited, of course.

They are reported to have labored hard during the spring and summer, in cutting a tunnel through a mountain, and making water ditches for irrigating purposes, building fences and improving the roads; then certain days in July were appropriated and devoted to recreation and pleasure. The St. George Amateur Dramatic Association have been entertaining the patrons of the Drama with "Sweethearts and wives," and "Mr. and Mrs. Peter White," and bro. Burgon says the St. George Hall was crowded on the three evenings the performances were given. "Delighted audiences" are said to have given proof of their approbation by long and continued applause.

MASS MEETING.—There will be a Mass Meeting in the Bowery to-day commencing at 9 o'clock, the object, we believe, is to consider the propriety of sinking artesian wells on the bench lands, within the corporate limits of this city.
