AN ACT

To fepeal the act of the seventeenth of June, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, prohibiting the sales of gold and foreign exchange.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of Amertea in Congress assembled, That the act enwithed "An act to prohibit certain sales of gold and foreign exchange," approved June seventeen, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, be and the same is hereby renealed.

WASHINGTON, July 18th, 1864. OF AMERICA: A PROCLAMATION.
