DAVID RUSSEL HELD FOR MUR-DER.

The preliminary hearing in the case of the State of Utah vs. David Russel, charged with murder, has occupied the time of Justice McIntyre's court of Price precinct. The complaint charges the defendant with having on the seventh day of October deliberately killed and murdered Peter Francis. The evidence brought out the fact that in a saloot at a way station north of here a drunken revelry was in progress on the evening of the seventh. The life The life David Russel was thereatened by deceased during the brawl. Others present were Wm. Smith, Jos. Gurr and a man Banning, commonly called "Rowdy Dowdy." At the tme of the fatal shooting it appears that Mr. Fran-cis was sitting on the edge of a cot near his bar, and just as the occupants of the roam had concluded the row had ended, they were startled by the firing of two shots in rapid succession. Inquiry showed that David Russel had shot and instantly killed Pete Francis, who was now lying on the cot with two wounds in his head.
