

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

The City Council met in regular session at 7 o'clock last evening, Mayor Sharp presiding.

IS IT INTENDED FOR BUNCOMBE? Shortly after the opening of the First District Court at Ogden yesterday

norning, the grand jury being in court, Judge O. W. Powers delivered the following charge: Gentlemen of the Grand Jury:

I have requested your attendance in court this morning, in order to call your attention—or perhaps I may say to recall your attention to one portion of the charge given you by this court at the time you entered upon your duties at the commencement of this The Court then stated to you that

The Court then stated to you that "you will find indictments against all persons who attempt to intimidate you or corruptly to influence your action, for the laws of the United States provide that if any person or persons shall corruptly, or by threats or force, or by threatening letters, or any threatening communications, endeavor to influence, intimidate or impede any grand or petit juror, or any juror of grand or petit juror, or any juror of any court of the United States, in the discharge of his or their duty, or shall corruptly or by threats or force, or by threatening letters or any threatening communication influence, obstruct or impede, or endvavor to influence or obstruct or impede the due administra-tion of justice therein, such person or persons are liable to punishment." Possibly I ought to explain the law to you a little more clearly, and say to you that any juror acting upon any United States case, or who has acted upon a United States case, if any threat-for threatening communications or any attempt to influence, intimidate or impede him in his duty is made with reference to his action in a United States case, it comes within this law. You will observe that the statute is quite broad; it covers any corrupt influence, that is, approaching any juror and attempting to influence him through any promise of reward, or by intimation that he may receive any reward, by means of money receive any reward, by means of money or otherwise. It covers, also, a case

where threats are used—where an ef-fort is made to intimidate a man in the discharge of his duty by means of threats. It goes further, and says that if any force is used, or if any threatening letters or any threatening commu-nications are made. I take it, it would not be necessary that the threatening communication should be by letter. I take it that the true construction of the act would be that if a man should the act would be that if a man should send by means of a messenger a communication to be delivered orally, that it would come in with the spirit of the statute. The law goes further and says that if there is any endeavor—which would mean any attempt to intimidate or impede you while acting as grand jurors of the United States, or any man who acts as a juror in a United States case, in this Controlled the the States case, in this Court—then the

I draw your attention particularly to this matter for this reason: that since the adjournment of court during the January recess, gentlemen who have acted upon the petit jury in this court, and who have been compelled in the exercise of their functions as jurors, to sit in United States cases, particularly the case of the United States exercise of their functions as jurors, to sit in United States cases, particularly in the case of the United States against Lerenzo Snow, have been subjected to indignities by people of this Territory, and to threats which, if the communications that I have received with regard to it are true, will bring the persons guilty clearly within the letter and the intent of this statute.

I want to direct you to fairly and fearlessly investigate this matter and to go to the bottom of it. If the time ever was that such things could be done with impunity in this Territory, that time has gone by, and if there is

done with impunity in this Territory, that time has gone by, and if there is any power in these United States to protect a man who is compelled to serve his country supon a jury, that power will be exercised.

If the people have been doing what it is charged they have done, it would be well for them to learn that they have no business to interfere with men who are summoned in the name of the law, compelled by the law to leave their business, to leave their families, and sit here for scanty pay to determine between respondents at the bar and the United States Government. 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
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
