LOCAL BRIEFS.

The ladies of St. Mark's Guild will hold a Christmas bazaar at the basement of St. Mark's cathedral, Dec. 1 and 2.

Miss Beatrice LaChapelle of Evansville is recovering at the Holy Cross hospital from an operation for appendicitis.

John S. Smith of the firm of J. R. Smith & Sons, millers, has just returned from a two-year's mission in Great Britain.

The Bailey Lake club will open its preserves to members desiring to shoot on Thanksgiving day, and today the preserve is closed.

Oscar H. Quinn, formerly a resident of this city, has died at Philadelphia, aged 40, and the body will be shipped to this city for burial.

Landlord and Mrs. Don H. Porter of the Kenyon are in southern California for Mr. Porter's health, leaving Captain and Mrs. Sam Porter to manage the hotel in their absence.

The funeral services over the remains of Mary E. R. Graft were held this morning at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. C. W. Listmann, 263 east Sixth South street. Interment was at Mt. Olivet cemetery.

Officers Furst and Gatehouse took the city prisoners out to work again this morning. The camp has been removed to Canyon Road above Fourth street where the chain gang will make some needed repairs. There is a small hill that is to be cut down, and the grade is to be smoothed down in good shape.

The cause of the death at Millford of 19 horses belonging to Taylor Bros. contractors, as noted in the "News" this week, is found to be anthrax, and Secy. Beatty of the state board of health has sent State Medical Inspector Garrison to make further investigation. The disease was caused by the horses drinking stagnant water. This disease is fatal to both men and horses.

A telegram received by Mrs. Rosemary Gloss Whitney from her husband, "Race" Whitney, states that he will be home to spend Thanksgiving. Mr. Whitney for some time past has been engaged in the newspaper business in the east, and was also manager of Pain's Fireworks in St. Louis. His father, Bishop O. F. Whitney, thinks he may decide to remain permanently on his arrival here.

The Commercial club has received from Fred J. Kiesel a fine, life-sized portrait of President Roosevelt, and the original of the president's letter to the late irrigation congress. Mr. Kiesel wrote to Secy. Harris that the gifts were made "as a token of the appreciation of the generous financial support rendered on that occasion under the auspices of your potent and wide-awake organization by the citizens of Salt Lake City."

At the annual meeting last night of the Utah Council of Royal and Select Masters the following officers were elected and installed: Thrice illustrious master, Dr. Ned W. Hewett, thrice illustrious deputy master, Dr. N. D. Eates; principal conductor of the work, Frank P. Sherwood; treasurer, Royd Park; recorder, M. C. Phillips; captain of the guard, Joseph G. Bywater; conductor of the council, Robert C. Simons; steward, John Reves; sentinel, J. Fred Corker. The installation was conducted by Past Thrice Illustrious Master Walter Scott, and following it a banquet was served.

The Bear River club has announced that after this week duck hunting will cease in their preserves, and word to the same effect from other points has been received. Knudson's hunting grounds being the only exception. Both ducks and geese have been driven south by the recent cold weather, although a few are found here and there. Jack snipe, it is said, have also vanished

unusually early this season, but jack rabbits are uncommonly numerous and sage hens and grouse are discovered in bunches in the foothills of the state and in Idaho and Wyoming. Not much game, in comparison with other years, has found its way to the local markets this season. What geese and ducks there are are selling at 20 to 25 percent above usual prices charged hitherto.

CHURCH SCHOOLS.

Supt. Tanner Reports Conditions in Utah, Idaho, Arizona and Mexico.

Elder J. M. Tanner, superintendent of Church schools, has just returned from the north after a visit to the Preston and Logan schools. At Preston the Onida Stake academy, which is in better condition than ever before, with 200 pupils in attendance and all doing splendid work under the guiding hand of Prof. John Johnson. At present a steam plant is being put in and every thing possible is being done to make the school agreeable and beneficial to those attending.

MORE CHANGES.

City Council Combines Offices of Fire Chief and Street Lighting Inspector.

The city council last night waded through six more chapters of the revised ordinances of the city and, after making several minor amendments, passed those which they considered. The only changes made were in the salaries of several officials. The officers of the fire department and its section of street lighting were combined and the salary fixed at \$2,100 per annum, the same as the salaries of both officers at the present time. The fire chief has been filling both offices in the past and under the combination will continue to do so, the only difference being that the auditor will only have to draw one warrant now for the salary instead of two as heretofore.

The council increased the salary of the keeper of the stray pound from \$340 to \$600 per annum. The revised ordinance fixed the salary at \$750 but the members of the council could not bear the thought of the poundkeeper receiving a larger salary than they, so they fixed it at \$600, the same as they receive. The salary of the inspector of provisions was not increased, \$1,200 per annum as proposed in the revised ordinance, but was left at the present figure, \$900.
