CUT-OUT WORK IS PARTICULARLY SMART.

Broadcloth sufficiently firm not to ravel at the edge is often cut out in big motifs, heavy net being laid beneath the cut-out pattern. The two fabrics are held together by mending tissue which has been laid under the cloth and cut out along the edges of the pattern. A hot iron presses the cloth firmly to the net. The cut-out design taken from the cloth, with the tissue beneath it, is applied solidly to the net sleeve as a trimming.

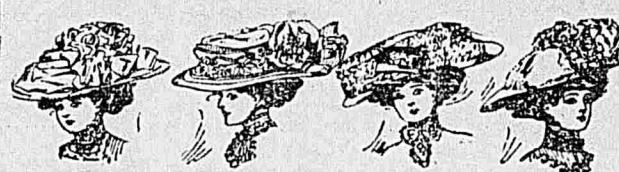
