LOCAL BRIEFS.

Death of Hans Hansen—Hans Hansen, aged 70, a shoemaker who came to Utah 45 years ago, died yesterday at his home, 1306 west Eighth South street.

Sherman Will Meet—There will be a meeting of shipmen in this city next month to discuss the situation and general conditions of the industry.

Boys Discharge—Private Marsh Steele, of the Hospital corps at Fort Douglas, sought his discharge by paring the government \$125, and will enter employment in civil life.

Music Cabinet Presented—John Fister, a member of the Catholic cathedral choir presented the choir at yesterday's service with a carved music cabinet of his own making, to hold the musical scores used by the church.

Kids Take Trolley Ride—The officers, parents and pupils of the First Presbyterian Sunday school filled seven trolley cars in Saturday afternoon's ride about town, each car being labeled with some advertisement for the Sunday school. The occasion was much enjoyed.

Plan for Winter Work—Several of the plans for the work of the Salvation Army during the coming winter months were outlined at the meetings held yesterday. Special attention will be devoted to the rescue homes and the children's work, and the assistance of the citizens will be enlisted in these departments.

To Attend Two Conventions—John D. Spencer leaves tomorrow for Atlantic City, N. J., to attend the convention of the representatives of the New York Life Insurance company, Sept. 27-29. Mr. Spencer will afterward go to Louisville, Ky., in attendance there on the annual convention Oct. 6-8, of the National Life Underwriters' association.

Funeral at St. Mary's—The funeral was held yesterday afternoon in the Catholic cathedral of Rafael Marine aged 73, who died at Holy Cross hospital from grief over the death of his son, Michael, who was killed in a Rio Grande river boat three days ago. The deceased came to Utah 22 years ago, after acting as a civil engineer for 15 years in the employ of the Italian government. He leaves no relatives in this country.

Freund; president of the congregation, Henry Cohn; directors, William Green, Dr. Joseph Kahn, David Spitz, Dr. Theodore Meyer, H. Barnett Leon Szwartz, Yom Kippur, the Jewish day of atonement, begins next Friday evening, extending through 24 hours during which no fires will be lighted in Jewish households.

Adams, who is now settled with her mother, Mrs. Barney Adams, in their new home at 309 south Ninth East, has just returned from an extended stay in Jackson, Wyo., where she made final proof of the land taken up by her a number of years ago. She enjoyed the experience of "roughing it" for a number of weeks, acting as cook for five men, her brothers among them, and had the pleasure of seeing thirty acres of her land covered by a flourishing wheat crop.

On Home Manufacture—Secretary D. F. Collett, of the Manufacturers' association gave an interesting talk yesterday on the home industries carried on at large in Emerson Ward, Granite Stake. Mr. Collett showed in his talk that the patronage of home industries by the people meant the enlargement of present factories and the establishment of others, which will afford more employment to the people of this city, and thus tend to solve some of the problems that now perplex parents.
