LOCAL BRIEFS.

Death of Hans Hansen—Hans Hansen, aged 79, a shoemaker who came to Utah 45 years ago, died yesterday at his home, 1208 West Eighth South street.

Funeral at St. Mary's—The funeral was held yesterday afternoon in the Catholic cathedral of Rafael Martinez, aged 73, who died at Holy Cross hospital from grief over the death of his son Michael, who was killed in Rio Grande seven months ago. The deceased came to Utah 22 years ago, after acting as a civil engineer for 15 years in the employ of the Italian government. He leaves no relatives in this country.

On Home Manufacture—Secretary D. P. Collett, of the Manufacturers' association gave an interesting talk yesterday on "Home Industries" before a large audience in Emerson ward, Granite stake. Mr. Collett showed in his talk that the patronage of home industry by the people means the enlargement of present factories and the establishment of others, which will afford more employment to the young people of the city, and tend to solve some of the problems that now perplex parents.
