GENTLEMEN:—The undersigned

respectfully ask your honorable

fire limits in the city, and to

Third District Court.—His Hon-

orable Chief Justice White, having been

assigned by the Governor, Judge

of the Third Judicial District of

Utah, took his place on the bench

of the District Court this morn-

ing.

Judge Foreman was also present

on the bench, having yet a number

of decisions in cases, which had

already been argued and submitted,

to deliver the rendition of the

decisions, however, being de-

ferred until the next day. Judge

Foreman being no longer judge of this District. All

the decisions prepared were rendered

excepting the last one, Sarah

Ann Cook vs. Hyrum S. Young.

When that was reached, Mr. Wil-

liams, attorney for the defendant,

said:

"Your Honor, does please in this

case."

"Yes."

"I object to your Honor

rendering any decision in this

case."

"This, of course, necessitates a re-

argument of the case, and its being

heard by the present judge of the

District."

Judge Foreman then thanked the

bar for their kindness to him dur-

ing his temporary occupation of the

bench, which he then left. He

sometimes gets a trifle confused.

On Friday he admitted that he had

signed an order to show cause with-

out examining it sufficiently to

distinguish it from a warrant of

attachment, and this morning he

inadvertently misquoted the title

of the case of "Sarah Ann Cook vs.

H. S. Young," calling it "Ann

Eliza Young," etc.

Judge White ordered the names

of the jurors for the term to be

called, when it was discovered that

a goodly number of them were ab-

sent, against each of whom he as-

sessed a fine of \$25, and after hear-

ing excuses showing inability to

serve, none of which he entertain-

ed, excepting from one, who was a

practising physician, the jurors

were dismissed till Wednesday

morning.
