WASHINGTON, D. C.

The report of the
Committee on Finance, Senate, No. 18, shows the earnings and ex-
penses for the entire system, including
the lines owned, leased and operated
from March 1st to May 31, 1884. Gross
earnings, \$2,225,700; operating expenses and all
charges, \$2,160,100, deficit, \$72,600.

Statement No. 2, revenue and ex-
penses for the entire system for
the same period: Gross earnings,
\$2,225,700; operating expenses and all
charges, \$2,160,100, deficit, \$72,600.

Statement No. 3 shows the financial
condition of the company May 31, 1884.
From which it appears that the gross
floating debt amounted to \$1,400,000
made up of the following items: Bills
payable, \$9,856,451; accounts payable,
\$6,735,452; company stock and bonds owned by
others, \$2,416,742; dividends unpaid, \$1,145,742;
coupons unpaid, \$38,993; called bonds, \$110,000.

The company has certain available
assets, which should be deducted from
this amount as follows: Cash on
hand, \$20,377; saving fund in the
bank, \$1,000; accounts receivable, \$3,000;
and accounts payable, \$3,000; company stock and bonds owned by
others, \$2,416,742; bonds owned by
Union Pacific Company, \$28,616,730;
annual interest to the Union Pacific,
\$1,145,742; bonds owned by others,
\$38,993.

Statement No. 4 shows the earnings,
the bonded debt and interest of the
branch lines operated by and in the
interest of the company for the four
months ending Dec. 31, 1883.

Total earnings, \$7,758,452; expenses, including taxes,
\$6,735,452; interest, \$1,000; annual interest,
\$2,416,742; bonds owned by others,
\$38,993.

Statement No. 5 shows the revenue
and expenditures of the railroads
operated by and in the interest of the
company for the three months ending
March 31, 1884. Gross earnings
inclusively of an income from investments,
\$3,475,190; operating expenses,
taxes and fixed charges, \$3,047,990;

Statement No. 6 shows the earnings
and expenses and the accrued interest on
the floating debt of the branch lines
operated by and in the interest of the
company for the three months ending
March 31, 1884. The interest on the
bonds exceeds the surplus earnings
for 1884 by \$247,524, while for 1883
it was \$1,572.

Statement No. 7 is a comparative
statement of the earnings and expen-
ses of the entire system for the four
months ending April 30, 1883 and
1884. The comparison between 1884
and 1883 shows a decrease in the
earns and earnings of \$1,255,328. Between
1884 and 1883 it shows a decrease of

of the largest receipts in the history of
the company.

Statement No. 8 shows the

company amounting to \$2,416,742.

The Democratic Convention.

SARATOGA, 18.—The Irving Hall delegation
declared for Cleveland.

The cause of the county Democrats
and the State convention delegations
adopted the following resolution:

WHEREAS, The New York county
democracy, in meeting with the
people who shall receive the vote of every
democrat, and of a majority of the people
for President and Vice-President, prepared
to nominate candidates upon national
issues to secure the democracy of the
State and the regular organization of
the party everywhere.

Resolved, That four members of this
organization upon the State committee
be appointed with full power to use all
reasonable efforts to secure a harmonious
representation for the city of New York.

At the Tammany caucus, Gen. Slocum
said: Wm. C. Whitney, the chairman
of the New York delegation, would
not be able to get a majority of
delegates agreed upon. His remarks
were applauded.

At 12:30 the delegates began to file
into the hall.

The convention was called to order by
Daniel L. Manning of Albany, Wm. C. Smith was elected temporary
chairman. He said: "Gentlemen of the
convention—We have met to day
to encourage every person who
desires the success of the democratic
candidates at the next election. The
