The temperature changes were unimportant except a fall of 10 degrees or more over portions of Utah, Colorado, southwestern Montana, Alberta and Wyoming; and a decided rise over portions of Arizona, Texas, Kansas, Missouri, Minnesota, northern Montana, Illinois and Manitoba.

LOCAL BRIEFS.

Hon. William H. King will lecture in the Twentieth ward on Sunday evening under the auspices of the M. L. A.

J. C. Lynch, a Mercur miner, fell down the Daisy shaft, sustaining injuries from which he may die. He is now in the Keogh-Wright hospital.

Low Jensen, A. C. Gilbert, Roy Watt, Ross, H. A. Remond and Edward Thornton were fined 12 yesterday afternoon for fast driving over the street crossings.

The funeral of the late Dr. J. S. Withers, whose death occurred at the Holy Cross hospital yesterday morning, will in all probability be held on Monday from the residence, 333 east First South street. The services will be private.

D. C. Smart, while exhilarated by spiritous fumes, walked calmly into a Greek restaurant last night and calmly walked out again with a leg of mutton resting calmly on his arm. Sparks were captured by Officer Milner and walked to the city jail.

The Veteran Volunteer Firemen of Salt Lake will meet at their hall, 211 Canyon road, next Monday evening at 8 o'clock sharp. At this meeting the election of officers will take place, and all members of the association are urged to be on hand at the appointed time.

At 3 o'clock this morning a fire alarm came in from the Scott-Steele building and the apparatus from No. 1 responded to the call. There was no fire, however. In some manner considerable smoke escaped from the furnace and the janitor thought the place was on fire. No damage was done.

Quite a number of Salt Lake people went to Provo last night and this morning to attend the funeral of the late Mrs. Tonie Smoot Taylor. Among others were Mrs. D. S. Spencer, Mrs. J. D. Spencer, Mrs. H. G. Whitney, Mrs. L. T. Whitney and Mrs. Joseph S. Tinney.

Word from Washington states that N. H. Darton, irrigation engineer, will be in the state in a few weeks to look over the local artesian and flowing wells situation. He may be accompanied by Chief Electrical Engineer A. J. Rogers, who will consider the pumping necessary to reclaim lands in this immediate country. Then E. C. Murphy, inspector of stream measurements is expected, to inspect the gauging stations.

The Utah Art Institute has filed its fifth annual report with Governor Wells in which the recent art exhibit and the controversy in regard to awarding the state prize at the exhibit is detailed in full. The report states that the expenditures of the institute for the year amounted to \$11,129.70, and that the funds in the treasury have been exhausted. All the pictures in the art collection, which are now in the Commercial club rooms, will probably be sent to the St. Louis fair for exhibition.

COMING OF MRS. FISKE.

Phillip Jacques En Route to San Francisco to Arrange for Month's Run.

Phillip Jacques, advance man for Mrs. Fiske, is in Salt Lake today, en route to San Francisco where he is going to make arrangements for a month's run at the Grand Opera House and also to confer with the local management as to the repertoire. It is expected that this will not only include "Mary of Magdala" but "Hedda Gabler," "The Doll's House" and possibly one or two other Ibsen plays. Mrs. Fiske comes to Salt Lake the week after next and will appear at the Grand Theater. Concerning her visit Mr. Jacques says:

"The bill here will be 'Mary of Magdala' and it will be presented on the nights of March 15 and 17. It will be elaborate—prodigious. There will be more than 50 people upon the stage at one time. Frank Gilmore will play Flavius and Hobart Rosworth does the part of Judas while Max Fegman has the role of the High Priest. It will thus be seen that she has exceedingly strong support, and that there will be no disappointments."

Speaking of Mrs. Fiske's plans for next year Mr. Jacques said she had accepted a new play from the pen of Hugh Morton, who hitherto has confined his stage writing to musical comedies. The drama is unnamed as yet, but is said to be a production of high dramatic excellence and one with which Mrs. Fiske expects to create a sensation.
