New Haven, Conn., June 30 .- President Taft paused in the course of an after-dinner speech to 1,800 graduates of Yale, gathered at the annual alumni dinner today, to issue a serious note of warning to Congress and to the leaders of the Republican party. The president declared that if the party failed to live up to its promises and the expectations of the people it would be relegated to the position of a minority opposition. The president spoke extemporaneously and his utterances as to the Republican duty seemed the result of a sudden im-nuise of these them of studied experienpulse, rather than of studied prepara-

TAUNTED THE DEMOCRACY.

Mr. Taft made no effort to explain his Mr. Taft made no effort to explain his wearings. The Yale men caught his meaning and the significance of the re-marks coming while the tariff debate is in progress, however, and they stood and cheered for several minutes. He had been speaking of Secy, of War Dickinson, a Democrat, upon whom Yale today conferred an honorary de-gree. He taunted the Democracy with the best of good humor as to its pres-

The president attended a meeting of the Yale corporation, spoke at the mid-day dinner of the alumni, presided over a meeting held for arranging a memo-rial for Yale men who died on both sides in the Civil war, stood for nearly two hours with President Hadley at the commencement reception and rushed tonight from a meeting of Skull and Bones to board his private car for Washington. Washington.

The commencement was notable. President Hadley announced the re-ceipt during the past year of gifts amounting to \$1,000,000.

has a lifting surface consisting of two pairs of propellers revolving horizon-tally in opposite directions at the end of a vertical shaft. The propellers ar-eight feet, eight inches in diameter. Two revolving motors of 36 horas-power each are used, but it is intended to use only one motor from which it is expected greater power will be derived. It is also expected to reduce the weight of the complete machine without the operator to 325 pounds. It now weighs 459 pounds. Mr. Berliner has left for Europe, but the work of preparing the new motor will proceed.
