

PREST. TAFT ON PARTY PROMISES

If Not Lived Up to and People's Expectations Not Realized, It Will Be Relegated

WARNING NOTE TO CONGRESS.

Made No Effort to Explain its Meaning, but the Yale Men Very Soon Caught On.

New Haven, Conn., June 29.—President Taft paused in the course of an after-dinner speech to 1,500 graduates of Yale, gathered at the annual alumni dinner today, to issue a serious note of warning to Congress and to the leaders of the Republican party. The president declared that if the party failed to live up to its promises and the expectations of the people it would be relegated to the position of a minority opposition. The president spoke extemporaneously and his utterances as to the Republican duty seemed the result of a sudden impulse, rather than of studied preparation.

TAUNTED THE DEMOCRACY.

Mr. Taft made no effort to explain his warnings. The Yale men caught his meaning and the significance of the remarks coming while the tariff debate is in progress, however, and they stood and cheered for several minutes. He had been speaking of the Yale men as a Democracy, a Democracy of War Democrats, a Democracy of the Yale men, and he taunted the Democracy with the best of good humor as to its present-day condition, and this led him into the declaration as to his own party.

"You went south of the Mason and Dixon line," he said, "to get a secretary of war to give a degree to it. It is well that you did, because he is going to build the Panama canal, and other universities will follow where you got in early. One of the difficulties that has confronted Brother Dickinson out in Chicago, where he has a temporary residence, was a discussion as to what constituted an orthodox Democrat, and whether he really ought to be counted

as a Democrat if he allowed himself to go into a Republican cabinet. Well, when you come to discuss what is a Democrat these days, you are presented with very much the same difficulty that I have before me now in giving certain rules for the construction of the pure food law as to what whisky is. They say there is 'straight' whisky, and then there is 'rectified' whisky, and then there is 'imitation' whisky. Now, I speak with a good deal of hesitancy in saying whether my friend Dickinson is a 'straight' Democrat or a 'rectified' Democrat. I would not dare to say in his presence that he was an 'imitation' Democrat.

WARNING TO REPUBLICANS.

"In suggesting differences among Democrats I am far from ignoring difficulties on our side. I remember in 1904 that Charles Francis Adams gave what I may call a perfectly good Adams reason for the election of the Democrat candidate over the Republican candidate. He said that one of the essentials of a successful free government was an able, patriotic and efficient opposition, and that as the Democratic party had utterly failed in reaching that ideal, he was in favor of putting the Republican party in that place. Now, I venture to say that while that may not be the reason which shall move the American people, it is true that if the Republican party does not live up to its promises and what the people expect of it, it will be relegated to a position like that of his majesty's opposition, and, therefore, I may say by way of caveat, that we have troubles of our own."

The president attended a meeting of the Yale corporation, spoke at the mid-day dinner of the alumni, presided over a meeting held for arranging a memorial for Yale men who died on both sides in the Civil war, stood for nearly two hours with President Hadley at the commencement reception, and rushed tonight from a meeting of Skull and Bones to board his private car for Washington.

The commencement was notable. President Hadley announced the receipt during the past year of gifts amounting to \$1,000,000.

VOYAGE OF THE FLEET.

In referring to the action of the Yale corporation in granting a degree to Rear Admiral Sperry, President Taft said:

"I assume from the corporation's action, although the spokesman of the university was a little bit chary on that subject, that it approved the voyage of the 16 battleships around the world, and that it recognized in Admiral Sperry the supreme ability, the supreme equanimity and the determination which were able to meet the requirements of the custody of the fleet which had not been restored in more than a decade."

"I wish to say with reference to that trip that while it was criticized at the time, there is no single order of my predecessor—many of whose orders tended so much to the peace of the world—which, in my judgment, tended so much to the peace of the world, as the order by which he sent around the world, not as messengers of war, but as messengers of peace—those wonderful mechanisms known as the 16 battleships of the United States."

CONFUSION MARKS SUFFRAGIST CONVENTION

Seattle, Wash., June 30.—The state convention of the Washington Woman suffrage association today was marked by scenes of the utmost confusion and almost violence.

A faction numbering about 50 led by Mrs. Mary Arkwright Hutton of Spokane, sought to oust the present state officers, headed by President Emma Smith Devoe, whose supporters numbered about 200. The report of the committee on credentials declared the Spokane delegation not entitled to seats.

In the debate on the report some of the delegates called others "thieves," "liars" and "scoundrels," and there was hysterical weeping and screaming. Speakers on both sides were hissed down. Both sides agreed upon ousting the newspaper reporters, one of whom, after his exclusion, telephoned to police headquarters that a riot was in progress in Plymouth church.

A squad of bluecoats entered the hall and found the convention in tears. The report of the credentials committee was adopted and Mrs. Hutton, on walking out of the hall, was followed by all her adherents. Then the regulars re-elected President Devoe and chose other officers endorsed by her.

A reception in honor of the officers of the American Woman Suffrage association given by the Washington State association was held in the parlors of Hotel Lincoln tonight. Among those in the receiving line were the wives of

former territorial Judges Roger S. Greene, Orange Jacobs and John P. Hoyt, who, many years ago, declared the territorial equal suffrage law valid.

GIRL SHOT IN DISPUTE OVER A TIME CHECK

San Francisco, June 30.—"Dear Emma: I am still alive," wrote pretty Caroline Barish, cashier and bookkeeper for Gray Brothers company in the office of the concern on the sixth floor of the Wells-Fargo building shortly after 1 o'clock today, and before the ink was dry on the postal card she was lying lifeless on the floor, fatally shot down. It is the theory of the police, over the trifling amount of \$2.50 in a time check.

All afternoon and tonight scores of police and detectives have searched the city in vain for J. Novak, a Slav quarry laborer, suspected of the crime. The shooting occurred in a populous office building in the heart of the downtown business district at a time when the elevators and corridors were crowded, yet no one saw the murderer enter or leave the building. Suspicion against Novak rests on purely circumstantial evidence.

Two young girls, stenographers, in an adjoining room, heard a man's vehement protest in broken English over the deduction of \$5.75 from his time check as a board bill, which was followed a few moments later by the report of the shot that ended Miss Barish's life. While the building hummed with excitement J. Novak, a quarry employee of Gray Brothers, walked into the office of a collection agency, several blocks away and cashed a check from which \$5.75 had been deducted.

The postal card that Miss Barish was writing at the time was addressed to Miss Emma Stoll, 260 Rhine street, Chicago.

WILLIAMS-BERLINER AIRSHIP DECIDED SUCCESS

Washington, June 30.—For the first time in America, a helicopter, a heavier-than-air type of flying machine, which depends on aerial screws for its lifting powers, has successfully lifted itself with an operator. A machine built by J. Newton Williams of Derby, Conn., and Emile Berliner of this city, lifted Mr. Williams from the ground on three occasions. The experiment was made a day or two ago at Mr. Berliner's laboratory at Brimwood, a suburb of this city. The only other machine that is known to have made a similar performance is that of the Cornu, French inventor. Scientists have always had great respect for the helicopter type of flying machine.

The Williams helicopter with the operator weighs about 600 pounds, and has a lifting surface consisting of two pairs of propellers revolving horizontally in opposite directions at the end of a vertical shaft. The propellers are eight feet eight inches in diameter. In the successful experiments the machine was so confined that it could not rise more than 10 inches, but it rose to that height.

In previous experiments the Williams machine had risen without an operator, and it has moved rapidly along a track in tests. The forward motion is obtained by the operator shifting his position forward.

Two revolving motors of 36 horsepower each are used, but it is intended to use only one motor from which it is expected greater power will be derived. It is also expected to reduce the weight of the complete machine without the operator to 225 pounds. It now weighs 450 pounds. Mr. Berliner has left for Europe, but the work of preparing the new motor will proceed.

New York, July 1.—In the cars operated by the Hudson Tunnel company bulletins have been placed announcing that on and after July 1, the special cars for women will be discontinued. The reason for this is that the photographs of women who were established for women while practicing, was apparently unappreciated. Special cars

for women have been carried on Hudson tunnel trains for the last three months. During the rush hours at first the women made good use of them, but of late it has been noticed that many women have apparently preferred to go on the cars occupied by both sexes than to use the vacant seats in the cars from which men have been barred.
