

**FEDERAL POLICY ON WATER POWER**

In Special Message Vetoing a Bill for a Dam, President Outlines What it Should Be.

**GRANTS SHOULD BE GUARDED.**

None Should be Given to be Held for Speculative Purposes—Should Not Be Unlimited.

Washington, April 13.—In a special message today vetoing a dam bill, President Roosevelt warned Congress that there are pending in this session bills which propose to give away without price stream rights capable of developing 1,300,000 horse-power, whose production would cost annually 25,000,000 tons of coal; urging in vigorous terms the establishment of a policy which should be held in an undeveloped condition either for speculative or other reasons. So far as I am aware, there are no assurances that the grantees (in this case) are in any better condition financially than they were at the time of the original act granting the privilege 10 years ago.

**FEDERAL POLICY.**

Discussing broadly the federal policy, the president says:


"Every permit to construct a dam on navigable streams should specifically reserve the right of the government to fix a term for its duration and to impose such charge or charges as may be deemed necessary to protect the present and future interests of the United States in accordance with the act of June 21, 1906.

"The provision for a charge is of vital importance. The navigability of every inland waterway and of all connected or connectable inland waterways as a whole should be improved for the purpose of interest and foreign commerce upon a consistent and uniform plan by which each part should be made to help every other part. The income derivable from this source would materially aid in the complete improvement of our navigable waters, for which there is now such a crying need. The chief engineers of the army report that the bills now pending at this session of Congress permit the construction of dams on navigable rivers capable of developing over 1,300,000 horse-power. These rivers run every hour in the day and every day in the year. To develop this amount of power would, under average conditions, require about 25,000,000 tons of medium quality coal every year. This natural wealth is the heritage of the people. I see no reason for giving it away. Though there is every reason for not imposing conditions so burdensome as to prevent the utilization of the power.

**ERA OF DEVELOPMENT.**

"We are now at the beginning of a great development in water power. Its use through electrical transmission is entering more and more largely into every element of the daily life of the people. Already the evils of monopoly

**ONLY MURDERED WRONG PERSON**

**Jealous Husband Kills Man Whom He Thought to be His Wife's Lover.**

**SUCH IS CORONER'S OPINION.**

Woman Says That Letter She Wrote a Friend Got Into Her Husband's Hands by Mistake.

New York, April 14.—That Julius Rosenheimer, charged with whose murder Frank Manaco is under arrest in Huntington, Ind., was killed by mistake, is the opinion of Coroner Wisenbender, who bases his opinion on a letter he recently received from the woman supposed to be Manaco's wife. Mr. Rosenheimer was strolling with his wife through the gardens surrounding his home at Pelham Manor, when a man sprang from the bushes and struck him down.

The coroner says the tragedy had its origin in the love of two fiercely jealous Sicilians for a woman and that one of them killed Rosenheimer by mistake while seeking his rival's life.

The letter read as follows:

"My husband, Domenick Manaco, is under arrest here and has been sentenced to 30 days in jail. He has confessed to me that he murdered Mr. Rosenheimer of Pelham on June 11, 1907. My husband was working at Liberty, N. Y. I left him and came to New Rochelle.

"I wrote a letter to a friend of mine at Liberty, but Domenick got the letter by mistake. In my letter I stated to my friend, Frank Delucia, that I would meet him on the night of June 11 in the Pelham woods. After he read my letter my husband was very angry. He came to New Rochelle and went to his brother-in-law, Frank Aiello, at 33 River street, and showed him a revolver and said, 'If it's going to keep me a whole week, I'm going to kill him and my wife.'

"I afterward went up with Domenick and we went to Pennsylvania, and afterward to Indiana. He was very jealous and every time we would quarrel he would say to me, 'All right; I made one mistake and killed a man in Pelham, but I won't make a mistake the next time. I'll kill you and your friends.'

"(Signed) "MINNIE MANACO."

Coroner Wisenbender's theory is that Manaco while wandering through the fields in search of his wife and Delucia came upon the needle merchant and his wife, and mistaking them for the woman and her companion, killed Mr. Rosenheimer before he discovered his mistake. The needle merchant was found with his skull crushed.

His wife, who was a few feet away at the time of the murder, fainted and could give no description of the assassin except to say that he spoke with an Italian accent.

**THE CAMELS HAVE COME.**

New York, April 14.—Consigned to a zoo in Chicago, a shipment of 32 camels taken aboard at Palermo, Italy, by the steamship Ida of the Austro-American line arrived at this port with their number increased to 13.

This process does not require the payment of duty in which they are to leave the country.

The paintings are estimated by the customs officials to be worth at least \$250,000.

"I drink to our two flags, and I wish that they may be united, for the welfare of the world's peace."

Capt. Kerr, commander of the Implacable, whose father was Lord Admiral Kerr, in response, replied:

"My father used to say with reverence to your majesty, that God had created a great emperor out of a man who had become a great admiral."

During the luncheon his majesty talked most pleasantly and without restraint with his guests.

**APPLICATIONS DENIED.**

That of Jefferson City Republican Central Committee for Mandamus.

Jefferson City, Mo., April 14.—The supreme court today denied the application of the Republican central city committee of St. Louis, to institute mandamus proceedings against the St. Louis election commissioner for the purpose of calling city convention. The application was recently filed as a test of the state primary election law. The decision handed down by the supreme court in an en banc, holds that the primary election law is constitutional.

**BILL TO REGULATE ISSUING INJUNCTIONS**

Washington, April 13.—Through Senator Overman the senate committee of the judiciary today favorably reported a bill regulating the practice of granting injunctions by United States courts, restraining the enforcement of state statutes. The bill provides that no circuit or district court shall issue such temporary injunction until testimony shall have been taken by three judges, at least two of whom shall be circuit judges. It requires five days' notice of such proceedings to the governor and attorney general of the state involved, unless in cases in which the loss of so much time may temporarily order may be issued. The bill also provides for a direct appeal of such cases to the supreme court of the United States and gives them precedence there. It is intended to meet the possibility of such cases which have recently arisen in Minnesota, North Carolina and other states.

**MAUDE ADAMS.**

To Appear Before the English Department of Yale.

New York, April 14.—Charles Frohman has accepted, in the name of Maude Adams an invitation from the English department of Yale for Miss Adams' appearance before the students of the department of Yale in Shakespearean drama since she played Juliet. These special performances will be given in the evenings of June 2 and 4, with the possibility of a matinee on June 4. The single performance at Yale will take place on June 5, and weather permitting will be offered in the open air on the campus of the university. In case it rains, the Yale performance will occur in Wolsley hall.

**WOULD DISBAR ATTORNEY.**

Chicago, April 14.—A formal petition before the Chicago Bar association, seeking the disbarment of Austin A. Canavan, has been filed as a result of a sensational search for a missing woman who was a patient in an insane asylum. The petition filed yesterday by her sister charges a plot to divert a \$250,000 estate to the plaintiff, Miss Annie Mahoney, sister of Mary Leinendeker, widow of a man who was wealthy and a prominent figure in Chicago 30 years ago.

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
