"One movement in Colorado is now well under way, and it promises to do much in making scenery accessible, although it will hardly serve any other purpose. It is financed already, and the surveyors are in the field, mapping a read which will be constructed, probably, by the end of the summer. The plan is to put up a modern, convenient, and luxurious hotel at the very top of the Royal Gorge, and to reach it by a mountain railroad running out of Canyon city, and crossing the Royal Gorge on a suspension bridge.
