NEW MAYOR AND COUNCIL. Policy of Reform - Appointments

May Cause Trouble. Special Correspondence.

Boise, Ida., July 18 .- James H. Hawley was tonight sworn in as mayor of this city, together with the new coun-

The election of James H. Hawley as mayor of Boise is regarded as a strong personal victory and also demonstrates that the old order of things has passed away. Bolse is a city of homes and churches, and the good people of the town have declared that gambling in all its forms must cease, that vice must hide its head and that the laws upon the statute books must be enforced. Mr. Hawley unequivocally pledged himself to this policy and was elected mayor in consequence. He goes into office with the best wishes of a large majority of the people of Boise and can make the office a stepping stone to the governorship if he so chooses.

the matter of appointments there is likely to be some scrapping should the mayor insist on using his prerogative to make nominations There is some talk of the Republicans refusing to recognize the right of the mayor to make nominations. It is

claimed they have legal advice that the council can fill the places without re-gard to the wishes of the mayor. It is understood they do not propose to interfere in the matter of the police

department, but will Insist on naming the other officers. The point has never been raised.
