

Food Wanted in American Hotels.

The thing which, perhaps, strikes us most disagreeably in the American hotel dining-room is the sight of the tremendous waste of food that goes on at every meal. No European, I suppose, can fail to be struck with this, and to a Frenchman it would naturally seem most remarkable. In France, where, as you know, people live as well as they like else, it is not better, there is a perfect horror of anything like waste of food. It is to me, therefore, a surprising thing to see the wanton manner in which some American hotels waste at one meal enough to feed several hungry fellow creatures. In the dining-rooms, conducted on the continental plan, there are rarely fewer than fifty or a hundred plates on the tables at dinner time. Every day and at every meal you may see people order their dinner and have an excess of this food set out, looking at one another and saying, "What a waste of food!" and the bulk away with it. I am bound to say that this waste is not only observed in hotels, but in the charge is so much a day, at least in those conducted on the European plan—that is to say, where there is notice that people go to lunch in the hotel, a wasteful habit. It is evidently not a desire to get more than is paid for, but simply that the hotelier, being a greedy and avaricious man, holds that the more food he can get out of the waste that is set out at such large tables as the dining-rooms and the grand ball-rooms of Chicago—and I have no doubt many other places—would be found in Chicago, say the—Max O'Reil & Co's.
