**Blaine to Lowell.**

WASHINGTON, 9.—At 11 o'clock

to-night, the condition of the Presi-

dent is satisfactory. He sleeps well

and without the aid of any drugs. It

is now the sixth day since he took

any morphine. Pulse and tempera-

ture did not rise so high from the ef-

fect of yesterday's operation as the

morning expected. The situation is

one of continued anxiety, but also of

cheerful hopes.

**Utterly Hostile to Friends.**

Singular enough not a single

friendly person has called on Guitau

during his five weeks imprisonment.

He never made a friend in the city,

and he has received no proffer of

counsel or aid. Such absolute de-

struction of friends is unprecedented

even among the lowest criminals.

He has never sent for anybody. He

intended and arranged to be driven

direct to the jail after the shooting,

and feels comfortable with his eyes

guarded him. It is apparent he

never expected to suffer for his

crime, believing he did a duty, and

was making room for a better man.

He believed the people would see

the deed in his light.

**Corn in Russia.**

Minister Foster writes to the

Department of State under date of

July 18, that the Russian wheat crop

is likely to be one of the largest ever

in the empire, and the export promises to

be greater than usual. It is stated

in the districts tributary to the port of

Odessa, that the yield is likely to be

so large that the farmers think they

could dispense with harvests

of four or five years. Advice from

Taganrog and Caucasus shows

promise of a crop equal to the crop

of 1874—one of the largest ever

known in Russia; and advice from

Moscow, which is the great

commercial centre of Russia, it is

reported all branches of business are

beginning to revive and flourish

after a long season of depression

solely on account of prospects of

abundant harvest. It will not be

without practical political influence

**The Banks of Gotham.**

NEW YORK, 9.—The Times prints

**Firing the Jews Out of Russia.**

BERLIN, 9.—So many towns and

villages in Western Russia, whose

population is principally Jewish, have

recently been burned, it is impos-

sible to resist the suspicion of sys-

tematic incendiarism. Up to the end

of June, 10 towns and villages were

burned. Since then fresh fires have

occurred. Two of the most terrible
