

EASTERN NOTES.

Rhode Island abolished the death penalty forty years ago, and now is agitating for its restoration, experience having shown that it don't work.

Mrs. Isabella Beecher Hooker, a sister of Henry Ward Beecher, has turned Universalist, and preached in the Universalist Church at Bridgeport, Connecticut.

The St. Louis Times, of the 29th March says: "President Grant was beaten in a thirty-five dollar suit before Justice Cunningham, yesterday. The proceedings grew out of a claim for milk sold by his agent to a dealer in this city."

Miss Beedy, of St. Louis, is now one of the shining lights among the refined women of the world. She is the English correspondent of the St. Louis Republican, and several other leading papers in America; and where she has lectured in the British Empire has gained golden eulogies.

It seems that the demand for iron in England exceeds the capacities of the mines in that country, and iron ore is now largely imported from Bilbao in Spain, where a hill of solid and rich ore rises to a height of seven hundred feet. Several railroads have been built to carry the stone down to the Atlantic, and various furnaces in Wales are dependent on the Spanish supplies.

A lady in New Haven has for three months suffered severe illness and almost total deprivation of speech, from a bronchial affection. She has recovered her voice in a singular manner. While in the attic of her house she was surprised by the noiseless and unexpected approach of one of the family. In her fright she suddenly cried out, and since then her articulation has been very clear and distinct.

The Buffalo Young Men's Christian Association has established a soup and coffee house, which is largely patronized by the laboring classes. In Chicago the Association has secured rooms in some of the railroad depots, in which varied reading matter can be found for the numbers of young men who always "resort" around a depot. In Baltimore and Cincinnati many destitute and homeless persons have been fed, and places of employment found.

About the latest defence set up by a murderer for some time was that of Nixon, the New York bill-poster, who slaughtered a poor fellow in cool blood because he would not get out of his way. The victim was riding on horseback, carrying a whiffle-tree across his horse's neck, and was shot by Nixon in the rear. Nixon's excuse was that the murdered man threatened to hit him with the whiffle-tree, but when it is remembered that the men were the length of two horses apart, the absurdity of his statement will be seen at once. During the trial Nixon maintained a bold front, and had his little girl seated on his knee with the hope of winning the sympathy of the jury. Like all other cowards, he broke down completely on hearing his sentence, and it is thought he may die of fright before the day of execution arrives. He should have calculated the consequences before firing the fatal shot.

According to Prof. Faraday, the crime of suicide is very common in this age of the world, for he intimates that all who die under 100 years of age may be charged with self-murder; that Providence having originally intended man to live a century, would allow him to arrive at that advanced period if he did not kill himself by eating unwholesome food, allowing himself to be annoyed by trifles, giving license to passions, and exposing himself to accident. Flourin advanced the theory that the duration of life is measured by the time of growth. When once the bones and epiphyses are united the body grows no more, and it is at twenty years this union is effected in man. The natural termination of life is five removes from the several points. Man, being twenty years in growing, lives—or should—five times twenty years; the camel is eight years in growing and lives five times eight years; the horse five years in growing, and lives twenty-five years; and so on with other animals.

There is an artificial coal establishment in France which produces the large amount of two hundred thousand tons annually.

The machine used for this purpose is said to be capable of producing ten tons of the fuel per hour, with a motive power of eighty horses, the whole machine weighing about sixty-five tons, with all its accessories and gearing, including the steam engine. These coal bricks are slightly heavier than natural coal, and their calorific effect is found fully equal, and, in some cases, even superior to the latter. The process of washing removes about five per cent. of the weight of the coal dust representing incombustible impurities, and the compressed fuel leaves only six to seven per cent. of ashes. The fuel thus produced from mere coal dust is sold to the different railway companies and the navy, besides a great quantity for household use, for which purposes it is admirably adapted on account of its regularity of form, great cohesion, entire cleanliness, and high heating effect.

The following is one of a series of resolutions passed by a Farmers' club in Illinois: "That, in view of the fact that the cost of sewing machines is from \$5 to \$7, or with tables and all complete from \$10 to \$30, while they are sold at from \$60 to \$125, we are often reminded of the fact that we pay enormous profits to manufacturers and middlemen. Now, therefore, resolved, That we will use old mowers, reapers, and plows, wear our old hats, coats, pants and bonnets and paddle our own canoe generally, until we can purchase at prices somewhat corresponding to the prices we get for our produce and labor."

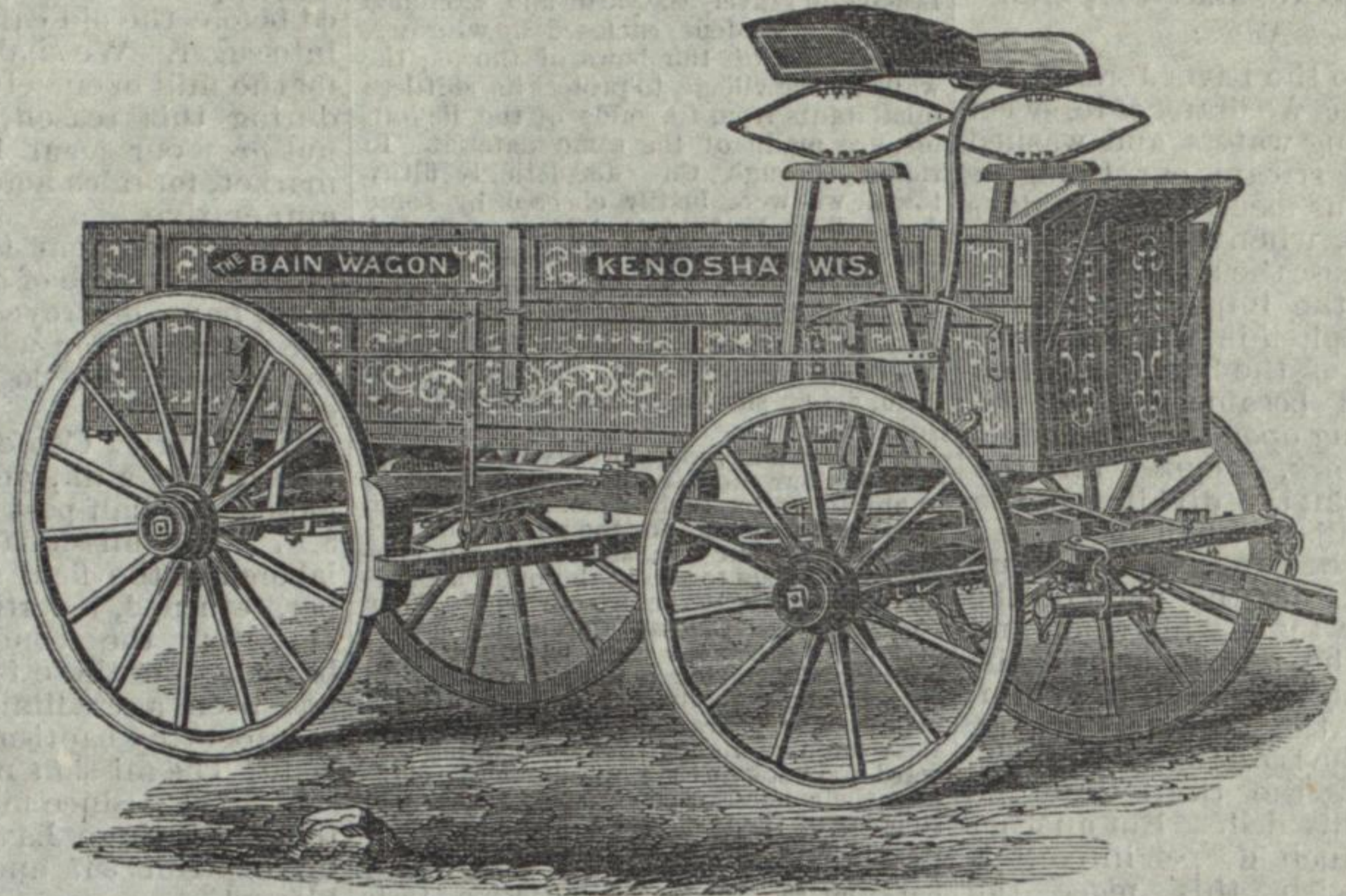

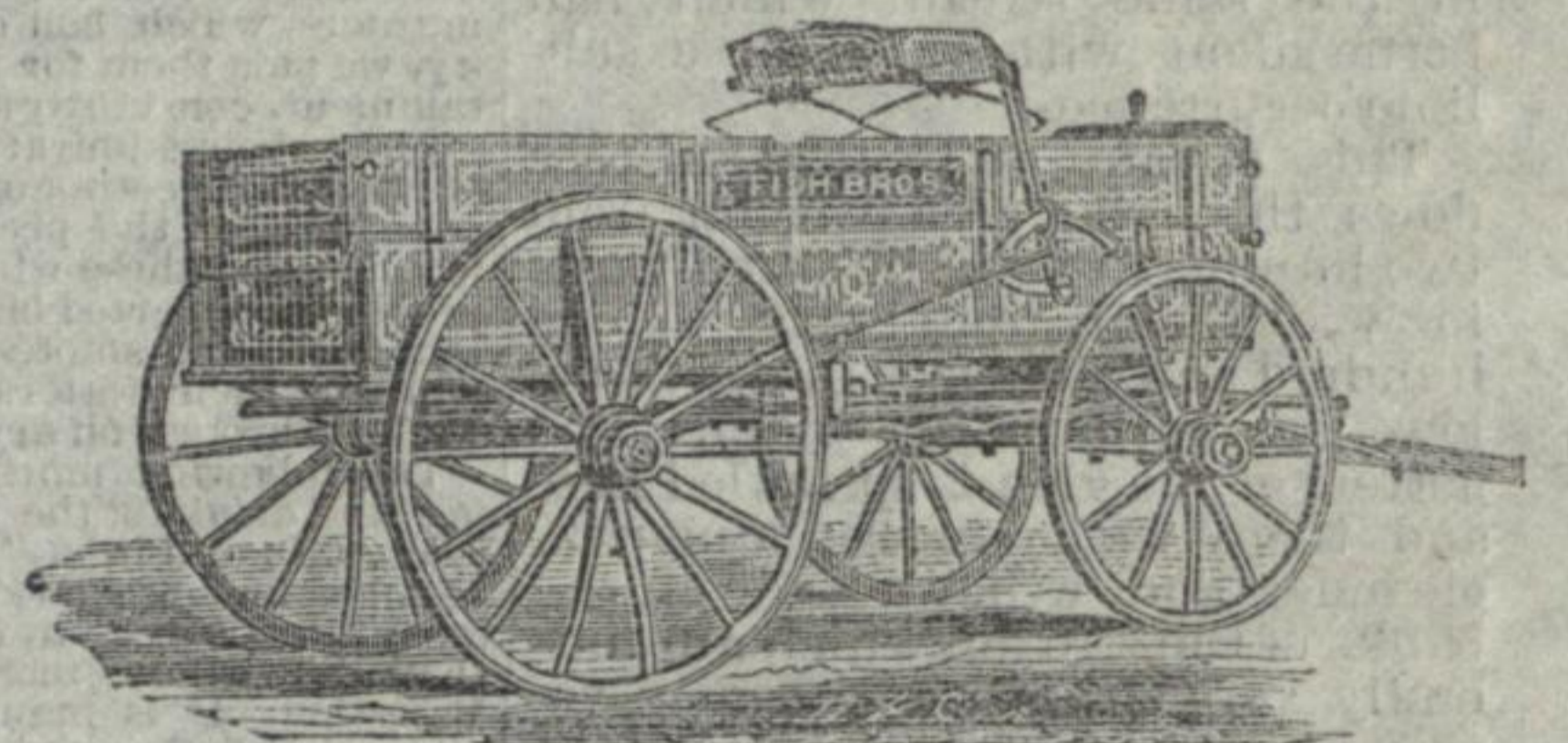
