

FIVE JURORS IN MURDER CASE

Nearly Two Venires Are Exhausted Before Quintet of Talismen is Accepted.

TWO PEREMPTORILY EXCUSED

Line of Defense May Be Self-Defense—Marovich Shows Effects of Confinement in County Jail.

Up to noon today only five jurors had been accepted by both sides in the Marovich murder case, now on trial before Judge Armstrong's division of the Third district court. When court adjourned last evening seven talesmen had passed through the grilling examination of both state and defense up to the point of peremptory challenging. This morning the state excused on peremptory Van Stetter, while the defense in like manner challenged George Buckle, leaving the five members of the jury to be sworn on the case as follows: Robert Savage, Neil J. Malmstrom, Samuel Lester, John Burton and Thomas Mariane. The first venire of 50 names was exhausted yesterday afternoon and the second venire had been largely drawn upon before the five jurors were secured. It is probable that the entire day and perhaps tomorrow will pass before the jury in the case is secured, as only those expressing satisfactory replies to the most searching questions are passed by either side of the case. The religious belief and opinions of each talesman are thoroughly gone into by the attorneys on both sides, as to whether the fact that defendant belonged to a sect known as Roman Catholic or any witness belonging to the sect known as Greek Orthodox church would have influence upon his opinion would have weight for or against the prisoner. It is believed the inside of the late religious wars among the foreigners at Bingham and Garfield, which led it to be believed that the killing of Mike Popich and the arrest of Steve Marovich charged with his murder, will be brought out in a considerable degree at the trial, and a competent interpreter will be secured to translate the testimony of the many Austrian and Greek witnesses who are to be called in the case.

MAY BE SELF DEFENSE.
The line of defense to be adopted can only be forecasted from the questions asked by the counsel for defendant of prospective jurors. Every talesman is queried as to his belief in a man's justification for shooting another in self defense, and if he believes one man justified in killing another for defiling his home. It is said that the charge will be made that Popich had been intimate with Marovich's wife, and that the religious feuds of the foreigners had nothing to do with this case.


DEFENDANT IS HAGGARD.
The defendant, Marovich, as he sits patiently awaiting developments in the courtroom, sits with a pale face and his confinement in the county jail since last July. He is pale and somewhat haggard, with a nervous expression in his eyes, and a look of injured innocence upon his face. His wife occupies a chair near him while an interpreter sits next to his wife and just behind Messrs. P. J. Daly and Soren X. Christensen, who are making a strong technical case for the defense of securing a new trial in case the issue goes against their client. The court room has been filled with foreigners, interested either as witnesses or as spectators, and curiosity as to the fate of their fellow countryman. District Attorney F. O. Looft is conducting the case for the state, assisted by County Attorney Willard Hanson.

BALDWIN SENTENCED.
Cyril C. Baldwin draws Ninety Days For Using Bad Check.

In Justice Dana T. Smith's court yesterday afternoon, Cyril C. Baldwin, the young man accused of forgery, was sentenced to a check for \$20 and passing it at Gray Bros. store, pleaded guilty to the charge of obtaining money by false pretenses. Justice Smith sentenced him to 90 days' imprisonment in the county jail.

FARMERS IN A FIGHT.
Asst. City Atty. Rogers has issued a complaint against Frank Parker, charging him with battery upon M. C. Holbrook. Both are farmers of Bountiful. Yesterday afternoon they became engaged in an altercation and Parker to blows. Holbrook alleges that Parker struck him in the eye.

WIFE GETS THE DECREE.
Lillie Coleby, whose husband charged her with being a careless and untidy housekeeper, has obtained a divorce from William Coleby in Judge Armstrong's court upon recommendation of Howard King, referee. Mrs. Coleby filed suit for divorce May 11, charging her husband with desertion and failure to provide for her, however, came back with an answer and counter claim, in which she set forth that he was compelled to get most of his own meals, and that the household of their home was neglected while his wife was out visiting. He further stated that when he came home of an evening his house was usually locked up and his wife was away, and asked for a decree in his favor. The report of the referee was in favor of the wife, however, and the decree was issued accordingly.

SENATOR CAREY AT THE THEATER

Wyoming Orator Addresses a Packed House at the Republican Rally.

Declaring that the years immediately ahead of the west are to be the richest and best in its history, that millions of dollars of the national wealth will be seeking investment in this country, within the next decade, in railroad extensions, industrial expansion, and irrigation systems, Senator Joseph M. Carey last night outlined his reasons for talking for Taft. "The election of Taft," he declared, "is a large audience in the Salt Lake theater," means that a great and sound and safe man will usher in at once the era of unprecedented prosperity. "Elect Bryan," he continued, "and you will postpone these good times until he gets out of office and until the evil of his being in office is overcome."

The rally is the first of four which Senator Carey will attend in Utah this week, the others being at American Fork tonight, Nephi tomorrow night, and Ogden on Thursday. Arrangements last night were perfected by the Republican State committee. Col. George B. Squires presided, and called on former State Senator Allison for a speech preceding the election of Senator Carey. Prof. Charles Kent introduced as a life-long Democrat who this season was for Taft, rendered a topical campaign song and a seriously patriotic song in both of which the audience joined.

Mrs. Margaret Zeig, who, whose stampeding of the Republican county convention has given her remarkable vogue throughout the campaign, was heartily cheered upon being introduced and was given an ovation when she urged the people to support the Republican ticket.

SENSATIONAL CHARGES

Addie T. Harrington Says Her Husband Drew Blood from Her Body With Buggy Whip.

Charging her husband with deserting her, and leaving her to fall back on her own efforts for support, with striking her with a buggy whip and drawing blood, and further accusing him of having unlawful relations with one Mrs. Hays of Salt Lake City, and with now living with her, Mrs. Addie T. Harrington has filed a suit in the Third district court for divorce from Dennis A. Harrington. The complaint sets forth that the couple were married at Salt Lake City Nov. 20, 1905, and it is alleged that since June 5, 1907, defendant has wilfully neglected to provide for plaintiff the necessities of life, notwithstanding that he is able to do so, earning about \$75 per month. It is further alleged that defendant has treated plaintiff in a cruel and inhuman manner, striking her on the thigh with a buggy whip about Jan. 1, 1908, with such violence as to draw blood, and at other times scolding her and calling her names and threatening to strike her. The complaint further alleges that between March 1, 1907, and Oct. 1, 1907, defendant, particularly on June 5, 1907, defendant and one Mrs. Hays sustained an unlawful relation, and it is averred that defendant and Mrs. Hays are now living together, against the wish and against the consent of the plaintiff, who avers that she has not lived with her husband since she became cognizant of his relations with the other woman. HOW TO OPERATE THE DR. WAS IN A CYCLONE

Seven Tickets and Three Amendments to Be Voted on This Election.

HOW YOU CAN LOSE A VOTE

If You Pull the Taft-Liberal Lever You Nullify Your Right of Franchise for President.

A voting machine is now installed in the Deseret News business office, where anybody wishing to "try out" his skill in operating the machinery will be at liberty to do so.

The machine this year contains three constitutional propositions to be voted on, listed as questions 1, 2 and 3. The first concerns the power to tax mines, giving it to the board of state equalization on the grounds that county assessors have proved incapable of properly assessing mining property and that therefore it has escaped its charge of the tax burdens. Question two concerns the total of the state's wealth, in connection with the tax rate, raising the total at which the present rate will be legal; and three concerns county boundaries, allowing the legislature to create new counties where necessary. The coming of the Utah reservation land into Utah brought this problem with it.

The party levers this year place the Democratic vote fifth from the top. Instead of its time-honored place of second. The globe background to a set of clasped hands, denoting the Socialist lever, comes second, while the Bryan national lever, denoting the Republican ticket, is third. Below the Democratic rooster is the Independence lever, and the list in the "American" lever. There are seven tickets in all, just enough to completely fill the voting machines. Three of them of course are substantially the same, being the Republican ticket, the Socialist ticket, and the Bryan ticket, which are distinguished by which it hopes to secure straight votes with national ticket holders.

DELUSION AND A SNARE.

But a curious fact for all to remember is that in spite of the elusive title a VOTE FOR THE TAFT-LIBERAL ticket is not a vote for Taft. By voting the Taft-Liberal ticket, you are voting for presidential candidates and register only the "American" state ticket. It is a trick by which at a pull of the lever you nullify your right of franchise for a national election. The Taft-Liberal ticket is the one from which the "American" leaders were forced to omit the names of Taft electors chosen by the Republican party.

The Independence ticket contains no state and county tickets, and anyone pulling that lever has still a right to turn down the little levers over the names of the nominees. The Socialist ticket is the only one which carries the country's flag. Nationally the Prohibition party has adopted the camel, but no local ticket has been put in the field by that party, although an effort was made to organize one. It is expected the voting machines would prove inadequate to the task assigned them, and the reversion to the old paper ballot system would have been necessary. The use of machines in Salt Lake County should make it possible to announce the results within two hours after the polls are closed. Instead of waiting until nearly morning as once was necessary.

ALL DAY SERIES.

Jesse William Knight and Judge King Address Audiences Yesterday.

The Democratic campaign of rallies yesterday touched the southern end of Salt Lake county towns when Jesse William Knight and Judge William H. King appeared in an all day series. It began at 11 o'clock in the morning and ended at Bingham Junction in the evening after meetings at Big Cottonwood and Union to complete the day's work. The speeches of Mr. Knight in each instance were a plea for the people to rally to his party in preference to electing either of the competing parties. Referring to the charges of Republicans that the "American" campaign was one party denying the rumor that an understanding exists between the Democratic and "American" party leaders as to co-operation in the impending election.
