Washington, Jan. 11.—An increase of the navy to the extent of \$28,000.000 was agreed upon today by the house com-mittee on naval affairs. The following naval program for ap-propriations at this session was adopt-ed by the committee: Two hattleships of 26,000 tons dis-placement, \$19,000,000; thive torpedo-boat destroyers, \$4,000,000; thive corpoloplacement, \$19,000,000; five torpado-boat destroyers, \$4,000,060; five torpado-boat destroyers, \$4,000,060; three col-liers, \$5,600,000; four submarines, \$2,000,-000; one sub-surface boat, \$400,000. Two battleships are recommended by the committee, instead of four, as ea-timated for by the navy department. The estimate for destroyers was cut in half, the navy department asking for 10.

An ammunition ship, a repair ship and two mine-laying ships, estimated for by the department, were refused by the committee. The estimates for the three colliers and the four sub-ma-rine boats were agreed to except that the committee added one sub-surface boat

GENERAL STOESSEL APPLIES FOR PARDON

St. Petersburg, Jan. 12.—Stoessel, Rear Admiral Nebgo Negbogatoff, and several other officers of high rank now in the fortress of St. Peter and St. Paul have applied for pardon or com-munication of their sentences. No action has yet been taken. Gen. Stoessel was sentenced to death, by a courr martial in St. Peters-burg for surrendering Port Arthur to the Japanese. Last March his sen-tence was commuted by Emperor Nicholas to 19 years' imprisonment and it was then said that a full par-don would follow.
