Paying their Debts—Letter of Recall Presented.

WASHINGTON, 10.—The commis-

sioners of the District of Columbia,

to-day, returned the last install-

ment of the U. S. loan, and the

amount paid large sums to laborers and

others in discharge of debts con-

tracted by the late District Govern-

ment, the increased tax rates giv-

ing them ample funds.

Mr. Jobe, Portuguese Minister,

to-day presented the President his

letter of recall, and expressed re-

gret at leaving the country.

Indians Surrender.

A dispatch was received to-day

Gen. Pope, announcing that Big

Horn, a Cheyenne chief, with

twenty warriors, seventy

women and children, and 200

horses, surrendered unconditionally

to the Cheyenne agency on Nov.

4th; the warriors are held in con-

finement.

Congressional Committee—

District of Columbia.

The House committee on ap-

propriations did not meet to-day,

as expected, a quorum not being

present; it will certainly get to work

this week to prepare bills in ad-

vance of the assembling of Con-

gress. The Senate committee on

appropriations meet on the 15th

and will begin by making a full

inquiry into the features of the

civil service, so as to be prepared

to act promptly on the annual ap-

propriations when received from the

House. A report of the committee

on the features of the civil service

will be made to the Senate to-day.

The report will treat on the

proper relation of the District to

the Federal government, and will

be presented at the opening of the

December session. It is believed

the committee will recommend

the placing of the affairs of the

District in charge of a commission,

with strictly defined powers, and

carefully guarded responsibility for

the various local departments

which they are to supervise.
