CONTINGENT FUND DECREASE. DOWN WITH "VILLAGE" GAG.

Total Balance on Hand is \$626,786 Against \$1,135,562 in Treasury Last Year at This Time.

The annual report of City Treasurer Swenson has been filed with Mayor Thompson and shows a decrease in the balance on hand in the various funds as compared with the year 1905 of \$508,-876.18. When the "American" party took charge of the city's affairs on Jan. 1, 1906, the balance on hand in all funds in the city treasury was \$1,135,562.60, while at the close of the year 1906 the total balance on hand was only \$626,-786.42, 'The contingent expense fund shows a very heavy decrease as compared to the year 1905. At the close of that year there was the sum of \$59,-473.89 left in the contingent fund and during the year 1906 the receipts of the fund amounted to \$423,452.37. The disbursements amounted to \$480,427.22 and the balance on hand in that fund at the close of 1906 was only \$2,499.04. The report contains the following statement of receipts and disburse-ments in the various funds and also the balance on hand:
