

WILL MR. BRYAN BE CANDIDATE AGAIN?

Chairman Norman Mack of Democratic National Committee Doesn't Believe He Will.

REFUSED TO PLAY FAVORITES

Says Governor Harmon of Ohio Is Growing in Strength Throughout the Country.

Washington, Oct. 29.—"I don't believe Bryan will be the next Democratic candidate for the presidency," said Norman E. Mack, chairman of the Democratic national committee, today.

Asked who he thought the next Democratic candidate would be, Mr. Mack declared that, due to his position, he could not play favorites. "Given" you published the fact that Julian Harmon, governor of Ohio, would be your choice for the next president?"

"No," his speech, made in Dallas, Texas, and picture were published just as have been those of other prominent Democrats. There is no doubt, however, that Gov. Harmon is growing in strength throughout the country. He is an able man and, as the Democratic leader who won in a Republican state, he is gaining more and more popularity. But there is a Marshall, governor of Indiana, who turned the same trick on the Republicans in

his state that Harmon did in Ohio. He, too, is coming ahead fast as a national figure."

THIRTY-FIVE IMMIGRANTS INJURED IN COLLISION

Fort Wayne, Ind., Oct. 28.—In a collision between a westbound immigrant train and an eastbound freight train at Toesin on the Chicago & Erie railroad this morning, 35 immigrants, mostly women and children, were injured, some of them perhaps fatally. The fireman of the freight locomotive was badly hurt. The whereabouts of the freight train failed to work.

SCORE OF MINERS KILLED IN COLLIERY EXPLOSION

London, Oct. 28.—A score of miners were killed by an explosion in the Rhymney iron company's colliery in Glamorganshire, Wales, today. Manager Bowen and two companions who attempted a rescue were themselves overcome by the afterdamp and perished.

UNIONISTS WIN BERMONDSEY BY-ELECTION

London, Oct. 28.—The bye-election today in the Bermondsey division of Southwark, a parliamentary borough of London, which was characterized by the most militant attack the suffragettes have yet ventured to make in their struggle for "votes for women," resulted in a sweeping victory for the Unionists. John Humphreys, Unionist, won the three-cornered fight with a plurality of 87, overcoming the liberal majority of 1,750 in 1906.

The vote follows: Humphreys, 4,578; Hughes, Liberal, 3,271; Dr. A. Salter, Socialist, 1,435. The Unionist victory is considered a severe reverse to the supporters of the bill, as the election was expected to afford a good test of the feeling in London and the country generally on the impending struggle in parliament.

Mr. Hyde has been interested in business for a number of years; he is nationally a Democrat, but locally holds to the slogan, "A square deal to Christian, Jew and Mohammedan."

IOWA SUFFRAGETTES FOR VIOLENT METHODS

Des Moines, Ia., Oct. 28.—The Iowa Equal Suffrage association today adopted resolutions favoring the methods adopted by the suffragettes of England.

"The day for passive methods is past," declared the president, Rev. Eleanor Gordon of Des Moines. "I am for adopting more radical methods." "And I," added Mrs. Julia Clark Hallam, "would go so far as to say that the suffragette cause. But if I were arrested, I would resist the officer to the last."

The resolution follows: "Resolved, That the women of the Iowa Equal Suffrage association, wishing to strengthen the cause, do endorse constructive methods in the legislature and do further resolve that arrangements be perfected to carry out such methods."

WOMAN KILLS MAN CLAIMED AS HUSBAND

Goldfield, Nev., Oct. 28.—Webb H. Parkinson, a broker, was shot and killed here this evening by a woman who claimed to be his wife. It had not been known here that Parkinson was married. After killing the young broker, the woman turned the revolver on herself. She may recover. The woman was a dancer in a theater here four years ago, and she says that she married Parkinson in Oakland, Cal., two years ago. She came here 10 days ago to compel the young broker to acknowledge her as his wife.

Parkinson's parents live in Greeley, Colo.

SAVED RICH MAN'S LIFE. RECEIVED \$200,000

Denver, Oct. 29.—It has just become known that Charles N. Bennett, a wealthy man of Hingham, N. Y., who died recently, willed \$200,000 to J. W. Casey of this city as a reward for saving his life 30 years ago. Casey is the proprietor of a prosperous laundry here and is himself comfortably well off. Casey and Bennett were school chums in Hingham and the incident which caused Bennett to remember Casey so handsomely occurred when the latter, who was an expert swimmer, rescued Bennett from drowning in the Susquehanna river. Bennett then told his companion that he would ever remember his heroic act.

EXPEDITION THAT BROUGHT HONOR TO AMERICAN FLAG

New York, Oct. 28.—A naval expedition that "brought honor to the American flag and added an empire to civilization," but which resulted in the death of nearly 5,000 Koreans, was the subject of an address by Rear Admiral Winfield Scott Schley on "Our Navy in the Hermit Empire." In recalling an incident little remembered by Americans, Admiral Schley related how on May 16, 1875, he was with Rear Admiral Rogers, with seven American war vessels which went to Korea to investigate the loss of the American steamer General Sherman (the crew of which had been murdered). "The Koreans would give us no information and when we entered the river, Seoul, in to Seoul, they opened fire on us," said Admiral Schley. "We landed 30 men with a number of guns and they attacked the citadel, which contained 5,000 Koreans. For an hour and 30 minutes there was a slaughter the like of which was seldom witnessed before. Not 10 of the 5,000 escaped. Some were buried under falling roofs and debris, while some were trampled to death. Eighteen months after that a commission of Koreans arrived in Washington to negotiate a treaty."

LATE JUSTICE PECKHAM'S POSSIBLE SUCCESSOR

Washington, Oct. 28.—The vacancy on the bench of the supreme court of the United States caused by the death of Associate Justice Rufus W. Peckham, was the subject of much discussion here today.

Well informed persons tonight regarded Horace L. Larrison of Nashville, judge of the United States circuit court, as Justice Peckham's probable successor, with Solicitor General James W. McPherson of the department of justice as the probability for the next vacancy.

Judge Lorton sat on the same judicial bench with Mr. Peckham and was the latter's choice for the vacancy that was later filled by the appointment of William H. Moody of Massachusetts.
