

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**THEATRICAL.**—Last night a moderate house witnessed the really fine comedy of "The Belle's Stratagem," and "To Oblige Benson." In the former piece Miss Lockhart's acting was excellent; the rest of the characters were very well played, though the piece went a trifle slowly. In "To Oblige Benson," which is a most excellent farce, any amount of sidesplitting might have been done while witnessing Mr. Trotter Southdown, (Mr. Margretts) in his endeavors to "oblige Benson." In pieces of this kind "Phil" is perfectly at home, and it is hard to beat. The other characters played well, and the piece went off with a vim. To-night "Lady Audley's Secret" will be repeated, and will be followed by the "Tragedy in Seven Acts."

**CLOSE OF THE SESSION.**—To-day closes the Eighteenth Annual Session of the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Utah. The present session, like all which have preceded it, has been characterized by the utmost harmony among the members of the two branches, and between them and the Territorial Executive. At the close of their arduous labors our Solons will return to their homes and families with the proud consciousness and satisfaction of having labored faithfully and disinterestedly to promote peace and harmony among, and to conserve the best interests of, the whole of the people of the Territory. The session has been a most successful one, and the high and responsible obligations devolving upon them as legislators, have been a blessing to the people of the Territory, and we trust that the labors of all future Assemblies will be characterized by the same harmony and integrity as in the past, and that their labors may prove equally beneficial to the people.

**THE WEATHER.**—The weather for the past few days has been of the most delightful kind, and gives promise of a very early spring. The sun shines with a splendor as unclouded as at midsummer, and we may confidently expect to see gardening commencing in earnest if the weather continues as at present as few days longer. We hear of heavy snow storms east and west, but in this valley, were it not for the rather cold nights, one would hardly think it was the winter season. This has been one of the most open winters known since the settlement of Utah commenced; in fact there has not been what may be called a heavy normal winter. It seems as though the weather had been controlled and tempered to facilitate the completion of the railroad. One thing is certain, it has been a great blessing to many hundreds of our people, for the weather being so mild, the heads of families have been able to work out doors all winter, and have had far better opportunities of providing the necessities and comforts of life for their families than are generally enjoyed in the winter season.

LEGISLATIVE.

**HOUSE.**—At 2 p.m. the House resumed its session. The Committee on Roads, etc., reported "An act repealing an act entitled an act granting to H. S. Alexander the right to establish toll bridges across the Weber river in Summit county," which was passed. The special committee reported back "An act of incorporation for pecuniary profit," amended; the amendments were adopted, and the bill passed. A communication was received from His Excellency, Acting Governor Higgins, announcing his approval of "An act pertaining to damage done by animals, and defining a lawful fence," "An act repealing an act regulating stray pounds and for other purposes," "An act to provide for mechanics' and laborers' lien," "resolution exempting certain iron works from taxation," and "memorials to the Hon. A. W. Randall, Postmaster General." His Excellency returned "memorial to Congress for an appropriation to defray the expenses of the Indian War in Utah Territory," stating his objections to the same. An act providing rules for working mines, involving easements, drainage and other necessary developments, was taken up and passed. The Territorial appropriation bill was taken up, amended and passed. An act to amend an act regulating the mode of proceeding in civil cases, was received from the Council, read and referred. An act in relation to interest on money, was received from the Council, read and referred. An act supplementary to the act regulating the mode of proceeding in civil cases, etc., was received from the Council amended; the House did not concur in the amendments. The committee on Elections reported the following officers to be elected by the joint vote of the Assembly: One Chancellor and three Regents of the University. One Attorney General. One Probate Judge, one Notary Public for Pi-Ute county. One Probate Judge, one Notary Public of Iron county. One Probate Judge, one Notary Public of Sevier county. The Council were requested to meet the House in joint session, for the election of the foregoing officers, to-morrow at eleven a.m. A message was received from the Council announcing their concurrence in the message appointed for the joint session to-morrow. Adjourned till to-morrow at ten a.m.
