

WRANGLE MARKS CITY CONVENTION

Persuaders and Followers Attack Each Other With Bitter Words.

BOTH LAND ON OPPONENTS.

Followers Kill Resolution But Persuaders Defeat Swensen in Favor of Snyder.

The "American" party ticket is now complete, and before the people for their consideration this fall.

It was finished in the closing hours of yesterday afternoon's convention after a bitter fight between the party persuader hierarchy and the common followers.

All afternoon the followers were biting at the persuaders and the persuaders were biting back. Bitter one was scored for the followers when they put a large edict in the Lippman resolution, offered by the advice and consent of the persuaders, dictating to every official his every official act.

The resolution placed the persuaders in actual command of the appointing power. It came out because Mayor Bransford would not reject and throw out of office officials who were capable and not suitable from a standpoint of a pure believer in the ancient spoils system.

To change the personnel of all city departments, the fire department and the police department, with each administration, is what the resolution calls for, if followed by other parties. To eliminate the element of capable service at a limit qualification to obtain an office in which political ideas run for nothing and ability for everything, is its principal meaning, and the disaster such a policy brought on the nation before civil service rules prevented it, and the rule it brings in all cities where it is the vogue, were entirely overlooked by the resolution's backers, greedily to dictate.

ANGRY WORDS.

Plugged because better citizenship had prevailed, and fearful of Mayor Bransford, who they dared not refuse to nominate, Lippman forced the convention into a turmoil of strife in a vain effort to ram its power down the throats of all candidates. It was a case of professional politician against the tax paying citizen, who values good government more than dictation, and in the final storm which broke over the convention many sore spots were created, and their healing is still a matter of the future.

TIN SIGN DUNHAE.

Not the least amusing feature of the great afternoon storm was that it followed kind words from Persuader Dunham, in which he declared that the "persuaders" existed only in the minds of the opposition press, and were spoken of in an effort to create dissension. STRIKE IN DEADLOCK.

J. R. Currie, president of the district council of electrical workers, says the strike is now on to a finish. The striking linemen of Bell and Independent companies are working at other things, says Mr. Currie, and will not return to the telephone companies until a final agreement is reached. A committee waited upon Fred R. Jones, superintendent of the construction of the Independent company, Aug. 3, and a wage scale satisfactory to both was about to be adopted when some difference came up over employment of non-union men. REPUBLICAN CALL.

When Primaries and Ward Conventions Will Be Held.

The Republican official call for a city convention and for ward conventions and primaries has been issued by William Hanson, city chairman. The call states that ward conventions will be held on Friday, Sept. 27, at 8 p. m., for the purpose of nominating in each ward one candidate for councilman for the four-year term, and for the transaction of any other proper business.

DISTRICT PRIMARIES.

Primaries for the election of delegates to the city convention and to the ward conventions will be held in the respective voting districts on Tuesday, Sept. 24, 1907, at places to be designated by the respective district chairmen. Delegates will be chosen at these primaries in the ratio of one delegate for every 15 votes cast, or major portion thereof, for the Hon. Joseph Maxwell for Congress at the last general election, as follows:

NAME MEN FOR CITY COUNCIL

Democrats Meet in Various Wards and Complete Their Nominations.

FERNSTROM WINS OUT EASY.

Third saw Most Activity—Five Ballots Necessary—Selections Made By Acclamation.

CANDIDATES FOR COUNCIL.

First Ward—Oliver Hodgson, Robert L. Penrose.
Second Ward—George Burbridge, George G. Smith.
Third Ward—F. S. Fernstrom, Harry Cowburn.
Fourth Ward—L. E. Hall, James Maxwell.
Fifth Ward—William R. Wallace, Samuel M. Taylor.

Democratic candidates for council were nominated at last night's gatherings in the various wards. In all of the wards except the Third nominating was done by acclamation. It was in the Third a decidedly interesting war waged over the selection of nominees. Percy A. Hill, candidate on the Democratic ticket for city recorder, made the only talk of the evening, referring to ex-Mayor Morris as the "incomparable." Mr. Fernstrom, who has been in the council from the Third ward years, was nominated and then the following names were offered: G. D. Hardy, Harry T. Coburn, Harry J. Hayward and Joseph H. Haslam. Five ballots were necessary to get the candidates needed out and when Mr. Haslam withdrew after the third ballot, Mr. Coburn was made short term candidate with Mr. Fernstrom, whose selection was assured from the start.

GATHERINGS QUIET.

The other conventions were quiet and attended by small crowds. When the name of Herbert Penrose was put up several times to know if he was to stay on the ticket or be substituted. Finally L. E. Iverson moved that the nominees be elected by acclamation, and Herbert Penrose being the man chosen. The meeting was held in the Ninth ward meetinghouse and Stephen L. Richards was chairman with Mr. Iverson as secretary.

IN THE SECOND.

In the second the nominees were George E. Burbridge for four-year term and George C. Smith for the two-year term. This convention was held in the Sixth ward meetinghouse. C. A. Carlquist acted as chairman and W. J. Korth as secretary. A special ward committee to act in conjunction with the district chairmen and the city committee was named with five members. They are J. W. Egan, Thomas E. Taylor, C. H. Carlquist, W. M. Homer and W. J. McDowell.

THIRD WAS LIVELY.

The Third ward was the scene of some enthusiasm and liveliness. A feature was the appearance of Edith Holly—the 18-year-old daughter of Cornelius Holly, who nominated Mr. Haslam. The young lady spoke with feeling and her calm, convincing stage manner were decided surprises and treats to the gathering. The ballots on the various nominees, briefly, were as follows:

On the first ballot Fernstrom received 46 votes, with 13 needed to nominate. On the second ballot the following were nominated: Hardy, 24; Hayward, 24; Haslam, 41; Hardy, 16; Fernstrom was nominated.

Hardy withdrew before the second ballot, which resulted: Cowburn, 20; Hayward, 29; Haslam, 25. No nomination.

Third ballot: Cowburn, 39; Hayward, 35; Haslam, 32. No nomination and Mr. Haslam withdrew.
Fourth ballot: Cowburn, 49%; Hayward, 34%; Cowburn nominated.

Then a ballot was taken to decide who would have the long term. This resulted in a victory for Fernstrom by a vote of 51 to 21.

It was decided to leave the selection of ward chairman to the district chairmen.

Percy A. Hill acted as chairman and William Deal as secretary.

THE FOURTH.

Judge O. W. Powers was elected chairman of the convention in the Fourth and Geo. D. Alden, secretary. L. E. Hall was named for the long term and his name went through with acclamation. Judge Powers nominated James Maxwell and these gentlemen were acceptable.

MET IN COURT ROOM.

Judge Diehl's court-room was the scene of the Fifth ward convention. P. Overberg acted as chairman and A. N. McKay as secretary. William R. Wallace, for the long term and Samuel M. Taylor for the short term were the choice of the Fifth delegates. Mr. Wallace is vice-president of the Inter-mountain Milling company and Mr. Taylor is the well known undertaker of 245 east First South.

FUNERAL OF G. W. ROSE.

Mexican Herald's Account of the Tragedy at Guanajuato.

Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon over the remains of George W. Rose, the obsequies taking place at the home of J. E. Palmer, 265 Second avenue, commencing at 2 o'clock. Dean Brewster of the Episcopal church officiating. Interment was in Mt. Olivet cemetery.

Mr. Rose was murdered by Mexican bandits in the city of Guanajuato, Mexico, Sept. 12, himself and wife being attacked while in bed. The following account of the tragedy is given in the Mexican Herald of Sept. 13.

"Details of the terrible tragedy which occurred in this city early yesterday morning reveal the circumstances surrounding the crime. Mr. Rose and his wife were in the same room with their little girl, and it is supposed that the three were asleep when the thieves first entered.

"Mrs. Rose, disturbed by the noise, first awoke, and the two thieves, seeing themselves discovered, at once made for the bed where she and her husband were lying, and attacked the defenseless woman with dagger and machete. The husband, startled by the assault, and in the struggle that ensued, he was horribly slashed and cut, bare-handed, and without a weapon of any kind. Mr. Rose fought the two desperadoes and beatly armed assailants. He pursued the thieves through the bedroom to the veranda, at every step receiving a new thrust. Despite his wounds he fought on, and was able to take from the hand of his wife a revolver which she had meekly found, and with this he

spared fire on the fleeing thieves. Four shots were fired but none of the shots took.

Attracted by the shots and cries, J. A. Padilla, living next door, hurried to the scene, but the thieves had already escaped. He found Mr. Rose in a pool, horribly slashed, bleeding from a score of wounds. Mrs. Rose was found a few feet from her husband, for in flight, one of the cuts he had received a foot long across the back. With the help of other neighbors who had arrived the wounded man and wife were taken into the house and surgical aid summoned. Both Mr. and Mrs. Rose were conscious and were able to give a clear account of the assault. Upon the arrival of Dr. Hyde he pronounced Mr. Rose's condition absolutely hopeless. Every effort was made to relieve his suffering, but at 10 o'clock he died, but fatal, and every hope is entertained for her ultimate recovery. Their only child, a three-year-old girl,

sleeping in the same room, escaped the notice of the thieves, and was unhurt.

Mr. Rose until Sept. 1 was superintendent of the Nagal mill, when he was promoted to take charge of the new Pinguico mill situated about three miles from the center of the town. He had come in last night in order to move his family and his efforts to his new home. Apparently the thieves knew through the week and culminated in the factor in robbing the house. His unexpected return yesterday imperiled their escape.

The news of the tragedy quickly spread through the city, and the governor of the state, Lic. Juanita Obregon (donated), the jefe politico of the district, Atlixco, Delgado, and George Bryant, general manager of the Nagal and Pinguico mills, reached the scene and immediately set about to capture the murderers.

"Naturally the American colony in

much wrought up over the murder of one of its best-beloved and most highly respected fellow members, and their grief is shared by the whole Mexican community. Of course, there is no political or international significance attached to the crime; it was the work of desperate robbers who found themselves cornered and resorted to extreme measures to make their escape.

"All Guanajuato is deeply shocked over the tragedy, and Mexicans join with Americans in expressing their horror of the crime and their deep sympathy for the stricken wife."

Mrs. Rose was formerly a Miss McGrath of this city. Her mother and sister reside here, but they are now in Mexico with Mrs. Rose, and as soon as her condition is improved will bring her to this city.

TO HAVE STREET CARS.

Cheyenne City Council Grants Franchise to Install Service.

(Special to the "News.") Cheyenne, Wyo., Sept. 19.—An important meeting of the city council was held last evening, and in addition to granting a street railway franchise, other important business was transacted. W. J. Barber, president of the Northern Colorado Power company, and vice president of the Denver Gas & Electric company, which owns the franchise, is to begin work on the line within 90 days from date, and will complete the main line within six months. First in the city are to be not exceed 5 cents, and between Cheyenne and Ft. Russell not to exceed 10 cents. Mr. Barber must file his statement of the franchise, with a bond for \$5,000, within 20 days.

This council increased retail liquor licenses from \$200 per annum to \$100 per annum. It is desired if this action will decrease the number of small saloons.
