Well Known Salt Lake Business Man Passes to Last Rest.

J. W. (Billy) Heywood is dead! The end came Wednesday morning at the Holy Cross hospital where he has been under care for general debility for some time. The body is now at Evans' undertaking parlors, awaiting instructions from the father in Cincinnati. Mr. Heywood was a member of the Elks' lodge and should the wires fall to bring word he will be buried in Mt. Olivet in this city. He was about 39 years old and was born in Cincinnati. HONORS FOR SALT LAKE.

Several Prizes Pulled Down at International Contest of Y. M. C. A.

The Salt Lake Y. M. C. A. boys are feeling good over the results of the in-

ternational educational examinations conducted in April by the associations

conducted in April by the associations of the United States and Canada. Ac-cording to the returns, Sait Lake wins two places among the best 10 associa-tions of North America, fourth place in the number of boys winning pass cards in the international examinations, and eighth place in the per cent of boy members winning certificates. On the results of these examinations six honor scholarships have been awarded to the students passing the highest grades. Last year the Sait Lake City association won fifth place in the first contest. The six men out of the 400 enrolled who won honor scholarships in the association evening institute are: W. F. Ross, for machine design; John Bar-rell, for chemistry, and Fred Kotter for electricity. These men represent five different trades and industries-raliroading, mining, newspaper work, telephone and photography.
