DR. CONROY WINS OGDEN ELECTION

Democrat is Chosen Mayor Over
Kuchler, Republican Candidate,
by 300 Votes.

REPUBLICANS GET OTHER PLACES

Democrats, However, Land Two Men
For City Council, and Give Other
Places a Close Run.

(Special to the "News.")

Ogden, Nov. 8.—The surprise of yesterday's election was the choice of Dr. Conroy, Democratic candidate, as mayor, over Kuchler, Republican, who was the only losing man on his ticket. Conroy was victorious through heavy scratching, and led in every precinct of the city his final vote being over 300 ahead of Kuchler's. The total vote was 6,005, an increase of 483 over the vote of the last city election.

In the various wards the fight for mayor was the center of the campaign. In the Fourth ward where both candidates lived, Conroy having moved there within the past few months the latter won by a lead of 76 votes. The nearest contest was in the third, which went to Conroy by only three votes. For the general city offices Republicans were elected, while of the councilmen the Democrats landed Thomas in the Third, and Flygare in the Fourth. The Socialist vote is omitted in the

REPUBLICAN VICTORY.

City Marshal the only Democratic Nominee Elected—Sectional Fight.

Special Correspondence.

Provo, Utah, Nov. 8.—The election here resulted in a victory for the Republicans, who elected all the nominees on the general ticket except the marshal. They also made a gain of two in the council, which will make the next council five Republicans and five Democrats, and six Republicans and four Democrats if the party should carry the election of J. M. Jensen, who was elected to fill the unexpired term of Jesse Harding to the courts and who, Mr. Jensen was elected to fill an unexpired four-year term now being filled by Councilman Bott, elected by the council. The Democrats hold there was no vacancy, the incumbent elected by the council having yet two years to serve, and they therefore did not nominate a councilman for this term.

The election developed into an east and west fight, and Mayor Roylance was supported by many east end Republicans, while Mayor Frisby received the support of many west end Democrats, which made all forecasting a difficult matter. This is generally conceded an unfortunate feature of the election by all parties, even those who advocated it, admitting that it was wrong in principle, but excused themselves on the ground that others were doing it. It has left some bitterness of feeling among the more active politicians, but this should not, apparently, extend to the successful and defeated nominees for mayor. Mayor Roylance announced, after the returns showed he was defeated, that he would support Mr. Frisby in every possible way in the advancement of the city's interests, and Mr. Frisby stated frequently during the campaign, that if Mayor Roylance was elected he (Mr. Frisby) would give him loyal support in his administration.

SAD DEATH OF JOSEPHINE MOYES

Young Woman is Supposed to Have
Taken Her Own Life by
Laudanum Poisoning.

CAUSE AN UNSOLVED SECRET

A' Evidences Point to the Theory of
Self Destruction—Mother Dead and
Deserted by Father.

Ogden, Utah, Nov. 8.—There remains very little doubt but that Josephine Moyes, though but 16 years of age, committed suicide, but the cause of her rash act may ever remain an untold secret.

The most conclusive evidence that the girl took her own life, was the finding in the door yard near the fence an empty vial which had contained laudanum. This bottle had been kept by the Hadley family in Miss Moyes' room, and it was known that it contained a quantity of the drug sufficient to kill anyone, but as the girl had never mentioned contemplating ending her young life, no one thought it dangerous for the poison to be in her room. Another strong proof of the young girl having committed suicide, and had contemplated it for some days at least, was a statement which she made to a friend, Ada Brostrom, Sunday night, that, "If I am not here Monday night then you will know that I am dead, because I am going to kill myself."

Dr. Jordan and Dickson made a careful examination of her body and came to the conclusion that death resulted from laudanum poisoning, as

definite as it could be determined without an autopsy, and County Attorney Hulaniski decided that that was not necessary.

It is very probable that Miss Moyes took the poison early Monday evening, as she left her sister and the other members of the family and went out on the front porch for a short time. On her return into the house she told them she was going to bed and retired. Later in the evening Mrs. Hadley went into her room and called to her several times, but received no response, but as her sister was a very sound sleeper, she supposed she was only sleeping, but it is now believed that the girl was dead, as her body indicated when found that she had been dead several hours.

Miss Moyes' mother died several years ago and her father struck his family, it is said, and is now somewhere in Nevada, hence her life has been unfortunate in the past, which may have been the cause of her ending her life. The girl bore a splendid reputation both in Ogden and Plain City.

Judge Murphy this morning decided on an inquest and autopsy to determine the exact cause of the young lady's death. The inquest will begin this afternoon.

AUTOMOBILE MAKES TROUBLE

Reckless Driver Runs into Buggy and
Later into Bicycle Rider.

Ogden, Nov. 8.—An automobile driven at terrific speed by election workers yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock collided with a horse and buggy near the city hall square, almost causing serious results to the occupant of the buggy. The names of the driver of the automobile or of the occupant of the buggy could not be learned. The automobile was traveling at a 40-mile pace along Washington avenue, and endeavored to turn the corner at Twenty-fifth street, going west. The automobile slid along on the pavement, striking the buggy with sufficient force to throw the occupant to the sidewalk, bruising him considerably. The horse started to run away but was grabbed by several men and stopped. The buggy was only slightly damaged and one of the automobile lamps was broken. The same automobile later in the afternoon struck a boy riding a bicycle, knocking him to the pavement on Twenty-fifth street. He suffered only slight injuries and was able to ride his wheel away.

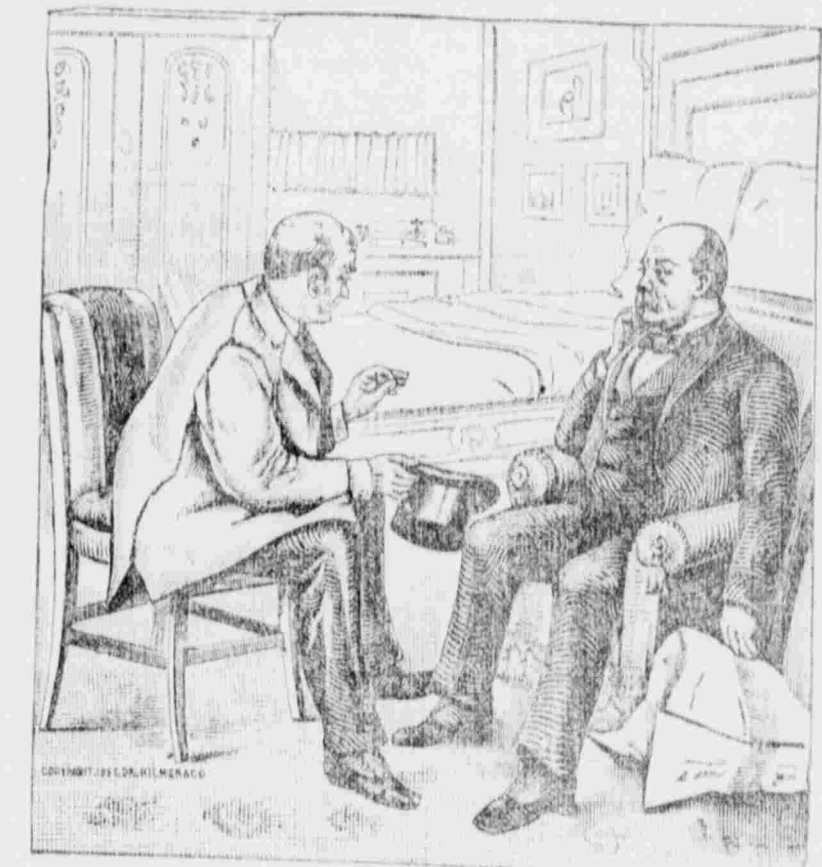
