REPUBLICAN VICTORY.

City Marshal the only Democratic Nominee Elected Sectional Fight.

Provo, Utah Co., Nov. 8 .- The election here resulted in a victory for the Republicans, who elected all the nominces on the general ticket except the marshal. They also made a gain of two in the council, which will make the next council five Republicans and the next council five Republicans and five Democrats, and six Republicans and four Democrats if the party should carry the election of J. M. Jensen, who was elected to fill the unexpired term of Jesse Harding to the courts and win. Mr. Jensen was elected to fill an unexpired four-years term now being filled by Councilman Bott, elected by the council. The Democrats hold there was no vacancy, the incumbent elected by the council having yet two years to serve, and they therefore did not nom-

inste a councilman for this term. The election developed into an east and west end fight, and Mayor Roy-hance was supported by many east end Republicans, while Mayor Frisby re-ceived the support of many west end Democrats, which made all forecasting a difficult matter. This is generally conceded an unfortunate feature of the slection by all parties, even those who selvocated it admitting that it was wrong in principle, but excused them-selves on the ground that others were doing it. It has left some bitterness of feeling among the more netty a politifeeling among the more active politi-cians, but this does not, apparently, extend to the successful and defeated hominees for mayor. Mayor Roylance sunounced, after the returns showed be was defeated, that he would sup-port Mr. Frisby in every possible way in the advancement of the city's inter-ests, and Mr. Frisby stated frequently during the campaign, that if Mayor Roylance was elected he (Mr. Frisby) would give him loyal support in his administration.
