

Prince Bismarck has ordered the preparation of plans for a canal to connect the Rhine and Ems rivers.

An official dispatch from Chicla, Peru, states that Gen. Caceres' troops have been completely disbanded.

The Bundersrath has rejected Prince Bismarck's proposal to tax the barrels in which American petroleum is imported as articles of cooper's work.

Lord Randolph Churchill, the new Secretary of State for India, arrived early yesterday in the Indian office. He is the first member of the Ministry of the Marquis of Salisbury to enter upon the duties of his office.

A conflict between the Mexican troops and the Yaqui Indians, in which 200 of the latter and six of the former are said to have been killed, is reported in to-day's dispatches, and further hostilities were expected to occur yesterday.

It is sickening to read the reports which the dispatches contain of the ravages of the cholera in Spain, which seem to be gradually extending and increasing in virulence. No less than 1,032 cases are reported in the past twenty-four hours, and 513 deaths during the same period. Verily the inhabitants of that stricken region are to be pitied.

As will be seen by the report of the Arizona Conference, which appears elsewhere, Brother Wm. J. Flake, who for six months past has been confined in the prison at Yuma, is again at liberty. The feeling he manifests, too, as to supporting the principles of the Gospel, are such as ought to characterize every Latter-day Saint. Brother Shonson will be the next released—on the 5th of July.

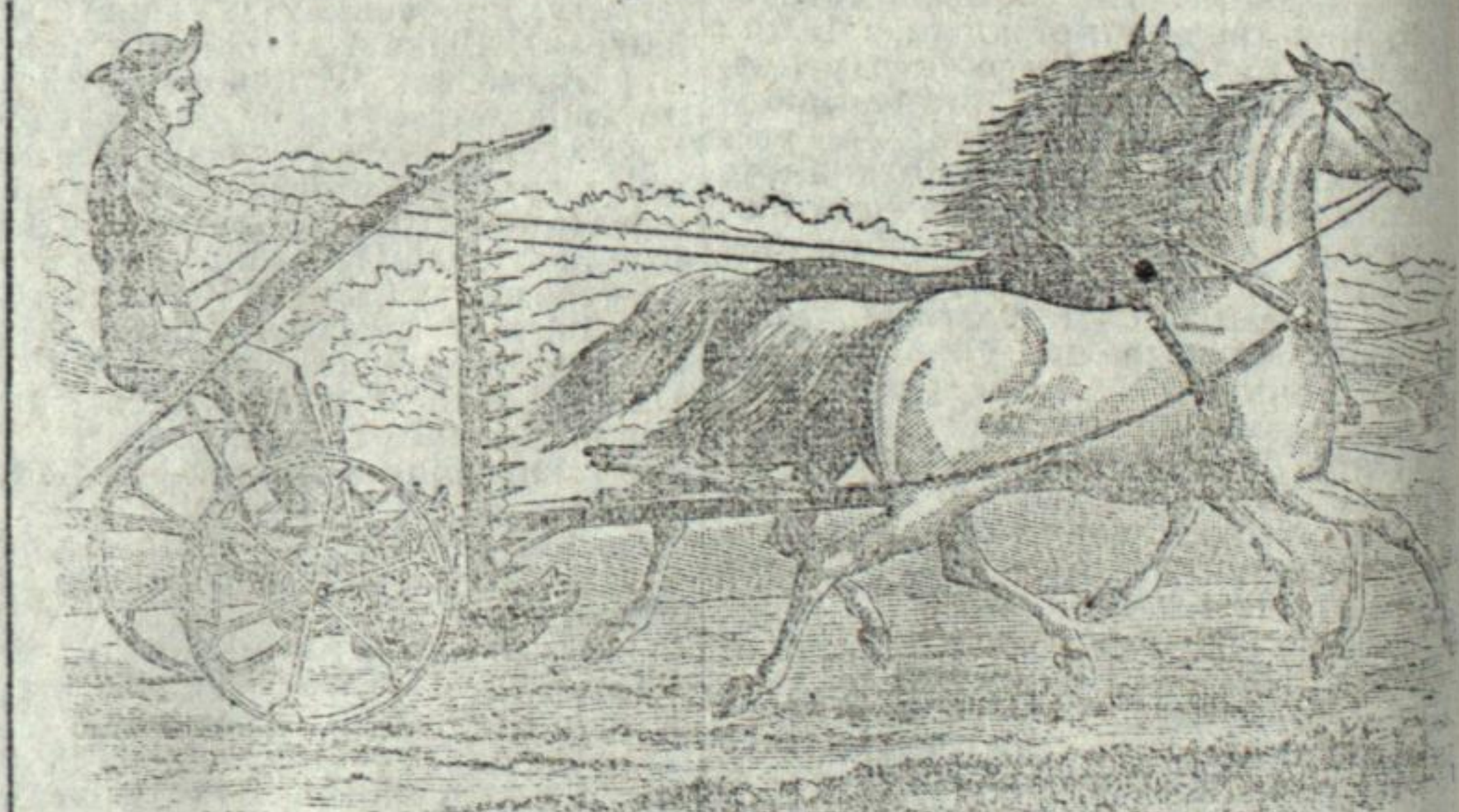
